INFORMATION: On 03/13/2022 at 2224 hours, an Officer observed the target vehicle traveling NB Pelham Road near Allen Pointe Drive with a defective passenger side headlamp. The Officer initiated a traffic stop on the vehicle at NB Pelham Road near Wick Road. Upon making contact with the driver, he could not produce a driver's license nor any form of identification, also could not produce any paperwork to the vehicle that he was operating and stated that he was giving his passenger a ride (seated in back seat directly behind him. The Officer had him exit the vehicle and detained him (handcuffed, DL/TC) pending further identification/investigation. A driver's license was

confirmed as suspended (STATUS: SUSPENDED). He also showed numerous warrants for his arrest through multiple agencies. Downriver Central Dispatch confirmed these warrants and advised that Taylor PD would take custody of them for their warrants. LEIN further returned the vehicle's attached Michigan license plate as improper and having been replaced by another Michigan license plate. LEIN also confirmed the vehicle as uninsured (EIV=N). During an inventory search of the vehicle, The Officer located a small black Otter-Box plastic box on the passenger seat of the vehicle. Inside of this box was a loose white rock that appeared to be consistent with crack cocaine. There was also a small plastic container in this box fashioned for holding narcotics along with a lighter, pens, and cigarillos. This box was within wingspan of the driver and was placed into custody (handcuffed, DUTC) for Possession of Crack Cocaine and Driving While License Suspended

(DWLS). He was then transported to Allen Park PD where he was booked and processed before requesting medical attention for chest pain. Allen Park PD made Allen Park PD and transported to Beaumont Hospital - Dearborn. The suspected rock of crack cocaine was seized and transported to Allen Park PD where it was weighed (0.1 gram), tagged, and placed into evidence locker along with the black Otter-Box case it was contained in. The vehicle was impounded by Allen Park PD and towed to impound by City Towing. It was then entered into LEIN as impounded by Downriver Central Dispatch
1. The improper license plate was confiscated and tagged before being placed into license plate locker at Allen Park PD. The passenger was released from the scene of the traffic stop. The Driver was eventually "released pending" from Beaumont Hospital - Dearborn. No citations were issued.

The attached paperwork is required at this registration: 1. Registration Form, 2. Medical History Form and 3. Parent & Player Concussion Info Sheet. Those registering a cheerleader will also need to submit: 4. Cheer Attendance Policy. A copy of a parent

or guardian's photo ID is also required to establish residence status. Veteran Siblings that are new to the club will be required to present a birth certificate with seal, a copy of which will be made.

Walk-in Registration for Allen Park Residents AND Open Registration will be on Friday, April 29, 2022 from 6:00 pm to 8:00 pm in The Shack at Cunningham Park. The attached paperwork is required at this registration: 1. Registration Form, 2. Medical History Form and 3. Parent & Player Concussion Info Sheet. Those registering a cheerleader will also need to submit: 4. Cheer Attendance Policy. We will require a photo ID to establish resident status, a copy of which will be made. We will also require registrants to present a birth certificate with a raised seal, a copy of which will be made.

This registration will be on a first come, first served basis (based on club bylaws) in the following order:

1. Club or League veteran AND Allen Park resident (excluding Northern Allen Park/Melvindale)
2. Allen Park resident (excluding Northern Allen Park/Melvindale)
3. League veteran AND nonresident Allen Park School attendee* (requires Waiver - Exemption Form signed by school principal, a copy of which is attached; includes private schools)
4. Nonresident Allen Park School attendee* (requires Waiver - Exemption Form signed by school principal, a copy of which is attached; includes private schools)
5. League veteran, in good standing with the DJFL and their Home Club* (requires Waiver - Exemption Form signed by League "Home Club")

6. Others* (League "Home Club" roster is full - requires Waiver - Exemption Form signed by League "Home Club" OR no League "Home Club" within city of residence)

*Please note in these instances the attached Waiver - Exemption Form is required for registration.

Registration Fees are as Follows:

- Mascot/Ball Boy (age 7): \$125.00 (League Age is as of September 1, 2022)
- Multiple Child Discount:

Payment Options. Cash will NOT be accepted for registration payments. Please make checks or money orders payable to Allen Park Bulldogs. During the Walk-in Registrations, credit/debit card payments will be accepted. Please note there is a processing fee of 3% for credit card payments.

Sports Physicals are not required at reg-

istration but they are required no later than the first day of practice. Sports physicals must be completed in the 2022 calendar year but not later than the first day of practice.

Anyone coaching during the 2022 season will be required to complete a Coach's Contract. Coach's Contracts are also required for all of our board members, junior coaches, photographers and weigh masters. Junior coaches are also required to fill out all the same registration paperwork required of our football players and cheerleaders. Junior coaches must have sports physicals, birth certificates and parent/guardian photo ID's.

Please note that this information is based on the league's current registration policies. Changes to the registration process could be made by the league. If changes to the registration process are made, notifications will be sent out promptly.

CABRINI SWIM & DIVE

CHS BOYS SWIM & DIVE LEAGUE MEET

The final competition of the 2021 – 2022 Boys Swim & Dive season took place this past weekend, and the St. Frances Cabrini Monarchs did not disappoint! After training hard since Thanksgiving, the team enjoyed the reprieve of taper, but then exploded in their final races.

This year's Catholic High School League Swimming and Diving Championship Meet took place at Waterford Kettering high school over the course of two days. Seven teams represented their school at the final meet, with no shortage of talent on that pool deck. While the competition was fierce, the Monarchs had spent months preparing for these final moments; they were physically and mentally prepared to leave it all in the pool for each of their races.

Day 1 began with two relays of Monarchs competing in the 200 Medley Relay

– 7 out of 8 Monarchs earned a Personal Record in this first race; including Kieran Fix dropping 4 seconds in his leg, as well as Joseph Berro and Ella Brash each dropping 2 seconds in theirs. Next in the 200 Freestyle, both Jenny Day and Giovanni Rea dropped 15 seconds off their seed times, and Senior Lily Heath earned a season record in her race. To keep the momentum, Freshman Ralph Kaleniecki swam the 200 Individual Medley and swam 11 seconds faster than earlier in the season! Eight Monarchs competed in the 50 Freestyle, an extremely difficult race to drop time in. Seven of the eight competitors dropped time; including Sophomore Tyler Noah who dropped 6 seconds. In the next two individual events, 6 Monarchs earned personal records – including Freshman Mia Rossman in the 100 Butterfly, Kyndel Gargarello, Jack Fitzgerald, Marin Gen-

aw, Kaleniecki, and Fix in the 100 Freestyle. Remarkably, Fix dropped 16 seconds in his race!

Next up was the 500 Freestyle; a grueling race of 20 laps by a single athlete. Each Monarch entered in the event dropped significant time and earned a personal best time – Junior Chris Russelburg dropped 25 seconds, Heath dropped 5, and Sophomore Drew Bylow dropped 4 seconds to swim a 4:58.31 (the first time he completed the race in under 5 minutes). In the final two individual events of the evening 8 athletes earned a personal record, with significant time drops. In the 100 Backstroke, Day dropped 10 seconds, and in the 100 Breaststroke Berro and Rea both dropped 5 seconds, with Gargarello dropping 7 seconds. In the final event of the night, the 400 Freestyle Relay, the team of Russelburg, Fitzgerald, Day, and Rossman dropped 7

seconds off their entered time.

Day 2 of competition saw the return of the entire Cabrini Swim & Dive Team – each relay team returned to compete, as well as several athletes in individual events. To begin, the relay team of Bylow, Lauren Schulte, Kaleniecki, and Russelburg placed 7th in the 200 Medley Relay, with Bylow, Schulte, and Kaleniecki earning a personal record in their leg of the race. Next in the 200 Freestyle, both Heath and Junior Taylor Bonar qualified to compete on Day 2, with Heath placing 17th and Bonar placing 24th. Kaleniecki also qualified to compete in the 200 Individual Medley and secured an 18th place finish, while in the 50 Freestyle, Bylow and Berro earned 10th and 24th place, respectively. Both Monarchs entered in the 100 Butterfly event qualified for Day 2 of competition, with Rossman plac-

ing 19th and Senior Cassidy Glazier placing 20th. After that, in the 100 Freestyle, Genaw placed 24th, Bonar placed 23rd, and Kaleniecki placed 21st and also earned a personal record for this swim.

Going in to Day 2, the Monarchs were prepared for Bylow and Heath or compete in the 500, but in a last minute change, Russelburg was also selected to compete as well. At the end of those races, Russelburg placed 24th, Heath placed 18th, and Bylow placed 3rd overall. Both of Cabrini's 200 Freestyle Relays placed in the top 16 with the relay of Heath, Schulte, Bonar, and Genaw placing 6th, and the relay of Gargarello, Noah, Faith Sterling, and Rea placing 15th – each athlete in the B relay earned a personal best record as well! In the final two individual events of the day, 7 Monarchs qualified to compete on the second day of competition.

In the 100 Backstroke, Fix placed 21st, Brash 23rd, and Genaw 24th. In the 100 Breaststroke, Rea placed 24th, Schulte 20th, Noah 19th, and Berro 16th. To finish out another outstanding day of races, both 400 Freestyle Relays placed in the top 16, with the relay of Russelburg, Fitzgerald, Day, and Rossman placing 15th, and the relay of Bylow, Heath, Bonar, and Kaleniecki placing 7th.

On the whole, the St. Frances Cabrini Monarchs proved how much their hard work and dedication to their team paid off. In total, almost 90% of the races swam on Day 1 and over 50% on Day 2 resulted in a personal or season record.

This past weekend, the MHSAA hosted their annual Boys Swim & Dive State Championship meets across the state of Michigan. At the Division 3 event, one individual competed on behalf of St. Frances Cabrini - Sophomore Drew Bylow. While this was not By-

low's first visit to the State Meet in his high school career, nor the first time he qualified in multiple events, this weekend marks the first time he placed in the top 16 in both events he competed in.

In total, Bylow qualified for 6 individual events throughout the course of the season and chose to race

in the 200 Freestyle and 100 Backstroke this year. On Day 1, Bylow was seeded in the top 12 in the 200 Freestyle, and after the completion of this first race, he dropped more than a second off of his entered time. The next day of competition was even tougher than the first, as only the top 16 in each event returned to swim again. Going into Day 2, Bylow had

In the 200 Freestyle, he swam a 1:47.97 which earned him 10th place, and in the 100 Backstroke, he swam a :55.42, and placed 12th. Each time Bylow dove into the pool he secured a lifetime best

record; a feat in which his coaches couldn't be more proud!

With the completion of this event comes the end of another season of Boys Swim & Dive. While the team looks forward to a much-deserved break, the coaches are excited and hopeful for what's to come next season.
