Sunday Oct 8th from 10 am- 5pm, the annual celebration of 19th century Farm Life took place at the Waterloo Farm Museum. This is the second year my daughter and I attended. We brought my husband for the first time. As a huge fan of the Little House on the Prairie book series and a resident of a disappearing agricultural city, now a suburb of Ann Arbor, my entire childhood, Pioneer Day brings childhood memories and happiness to mind.

We explored the grounds and outbuildings, watching the different craftsmen

demonstrate their talents. This was a memorable part of the day for me. Many of the craftsmen are hanging onto a dying craft or a craft that was once very important but due technology no longer required. Knowing the way to share and continue the craft is by passing it on to younger generations, the willingness to share and teach is pretty wonderful. The blacksmiths were happily answering questions and demonstrating their skills to curious onlookers. The ladies of the needlework club were more than willing to help me learn to sew if I was willing to join the needlework club. They explained



that they needed someone willing to grab the torch and keep things going. They were incredibly welcoming to anyone interested in working on or learning skills. This is a great service because once covid hit, Joanne Fabric stopped providing lessons in-store.. These craftsmen are a treasure willing to teach and share their knowledge!

Maybe it was specifically exciting for me to find a group of like-minded people, but the docents and craftsmen made the event special. Learning the details of what life was like was very interesting to me. Small details regarding the challenges of washing tablecloths so this was what was done with serving utensils are details that would be lost or over-

looked. The docents remembered to share causing those listening to nod and think, "Oh yes, you couldn't just toss a tablecloth into the washer, so you'd be much more careful about getting it dirty."

We found someone gladly sharing information with anyone interested and so each of us found enjoyment. My husband was very interested in learning about guns and bullets, my daughter loved learning that the horses that pulled our wagon were originally war horses riddled by knights. She loved listening to the women who took us on our wagon ride explain that the horse on the left was still learning and got nervous in certain situations. She could tell when the horse was nervous and did ev-





erything she could to put him at ease. As we waited for our turn to ride we enjoyed listening to live music and watched some future Farmers put together a barn for the Michigan Barn Preservation Network. In short, whether you like history, guns, crafts, horses or music, there was something fun for everyone at Pioneer Day at Waterloo Farm and Dewy School Museum.

Washtenaw County Health Department Shares Findings from Extreme Weather **Preparedness Survey** Survey results from local seniors will inform emergency preparedness work

Washtenaw The Health De-County partment is releasing an Extreme Weather Preparedness Survey Summary detailing findings from a local survey of older adults in Washtenaw. The summary shares key survey findings deknowledge scribing gaps and barriers to community preparedness in the event of an extreme weather emergency.

"We're seeing more and more extreme weather locally as a result of climate change," says Amanda Harris, CDC public health associate with the Washtenaw County Health Department. "After the widespread power outages from storms in summer 2021, we implemented this survey to identify and learn about members of our community who may be disproportionally impacted by extreme weather events."

The survey initially

members living in population-dense senior apartment complexes and communities impacted by power outages in Ypsilanti and Ypsilanti Township. It was then later opened to the general population of Washtenaw County, with a focus on older adults. A total of 255 respondents completed the survey between June and October 2022.

"We were glad to see many community members reported understanding the difference between emergency watches and warnings, but they are less likely to be aware of other local emergency information resources or alert systems," says Kimberly Collom, MS, Washtenaw County Health Department emergency preparedness manager. "Many seniors surveyed have health conditions, rely adaptive equipon ment, or have medica-

cial accommodations - all of these needs must be considered as we prepare for extreme weather events in Washtenaw."

"Our survey findings highlight the need for additional support systems to address basic needs like food, water, transportation, shelter, and medication during weather emergencies," continues Harris. "At the same time, individual actions like signing up for local alerts, preparing an emergency kit, and making an emergency plan can go a long way in protecting health during emergencies."

The survey asked respondents where they seek out information during emergencies, what emergency supplies they have on hand, who they can turn to when they need help, and how vulnerable they feel they are to losing basic resources

> The Health Department is using American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funding to expand its emergency preparedness work. This includes hiring of two health educators and capacity for community preparedness initiatives (e.g., educational trainings emergency kit and supplies). Additionally, this funding will support volunteer management and coordination activities to better prepare for and respond to future weather-related events and health emergencies.




