

H&H Sugarbush Maple Open House

Just beyond the proving grounds is a long driveway, a tent sat just to the right of the driveway. I was unsure what to expect. I know it's maple syrup season in Michigan, my one tree is tapped in the back-yard and I've attended the Old Time Maple Sugar Festival at Waterloo. But, H&H sells syrup everywhere, so I expected their process did not include stirring sap over an open fire until it finally boils down. I imagined the process was more factory like,

so I was unsure what I would see on the tour.

The tour started with the wife. I either did not catch her name as I joined after introductions were made or I missed it during the stream of questions from a precocious seven-year-old on the tour. I later learned her name is Michelle and she is a teacher, which made her role as tour guide with such an enthusiastic learner, perfect. His curiosity made it so I did not have to ask a single question and learned more about maple syrup than I ever have, in spite of mak-



ing my own each year. She walked us out to the tapped trees. H&H tapped about 600 this They've done more in the past but she explained that this is a family business and more was overwhelming. The property and farm has been in the family for over 100 years, but the family turned to syrup about 17 years ago, when their oldest child was just a toddler. H&H taps sugar maples, red maples and silver maples. The natural forest where the tress are tapped has plastic or silicone tubing running

throughout, but the sap flows underground these days to a little pump house. We learn that the sap is considered the blood of the tree and as long as we don't drill our taps too deep, the wound will close and heal. Much to the chagrin of the young curious person, we don't tap seven year-old trees, just as we don't allow seven-year-olds to donate blood. At the little pump shed, we learned that there's an app to ensure lines have not been nibbled by squirrels and that technology does play a role in



larger productions. A daughter, somewhere in her teens, showed me early on that much like the farming children I grew up with, she did not share her parents enthusiasm for the family business but she still did her part to make it successful. Things change, but they also stay the same.

H&H tapped their tree around February first and started boiling sap around the tenth.

After multiple seventy degree days, Michelle explained that the sap traveled up the tree to feed what would soon be leaves and had stopped running. H&H collected about half its usual syrup for the year. El Ninio or climate change caused a dip in syrup collection. We headed to the Sugar House for the final leg of the tour. Michelle's husband Kirk continued on page 9





Washtenaw County Health Department Shares Community Health Assessment and Identified Health Priorities

Community health improvement efforts will focus on mental health, access to health care, and access to healthy food

The Washtenaw County Health Department (WCHD) is proud to share that the countywide Community Health Assessment (CHA) has been completed. Typically conducted every five years, the CHA helps the Health Department document our community's health needs so we can work to address them together with partners and community through collaborative planning and activities.

"Our CHA was a collective effort that would not have been possible without the help of community organizations and community members who

share our commitment to improve health and quality of life," says Jimena Loveluck,

MSW, health officer.

"The 2023 CHA is a prime example of the value these community partnerships bring to local public health work in Washtenaw County. We look forward to acting on what we learned through our CHA to improve health for everyone in our county."

In addition to providing a roadmap for future Health Department activities, this assessment can also be used by community groups and members working to improve health in Washtenaw. Everyone is welcome to see the findings from our CHA and follow the development of our Community

Health Improvement Plan on our Health for All website: https:// healthforallwashtenaw. org/cha

CHA Process

The CHA pulls together existing health data with perspectives from community members and partners. Community input was collected through surveys, one-on-one interviews, focus groups, and windshield tours (assessments of physical spaces throughout the county). All of this helps the Health Department and partners better understand the factors that make it easier or more difficult for our community members to live their healthiest lives.

"Our Health Department's approach to this process is really rooted in our commitment to health equity," says Dayna Brimley, MPH, comcontinued on page 6



Community Health Improvement

Plan (CHIP)

Following the CHA, the next step was to prioritize three health topics that the Department will focus on for the next five years as part of our Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP). A complete list of health needs that emerged through the CHA is available here.

In November 2023, we hosted a State of Our Health event convening community Following a presentation of findings from the CHA, attendees participated in a prioritization scoring activity to select the three

priority health needs to focus the CHIP. We also conducted five smaller group sessions with additional community members who also participated in the prioritization scoring activity.

We then reviewed results from all the scoring activities and identified three priority areas for the 2024 CHIP: mental health, access to health care, and access to healthy

"The importance of members and partners. mental health services access and support continually came up as we spoke with community members during our CHA," says Loveluck. "Our community

recognizes that mental health is an essential part of wellbeing, and we're ready to work together to improve mental health for our Washtenaw neighbors."

"Access to health care and healthy food are essential to the overall health of our county," says Brimley. "The next part of our process is all about putting actionable goals in place to make real improvements in each of these priority areas - together."







In many ways, people who are aging on their own have experiences that are different from those who are aging while surrounded by family members. For the last three years, a group from Eastern Michigan University (EMU) has been exploring issues and concerns unique to

solo aging. The result area senior centers is the production of Solo Acts, a Limelight theatrical performance that combines storytelling and theatre to illuminate the complexity, challenges, opportunities and visibility of solo agers.



Unlike my one bucket boil process, the sap is pumped into the sugar house where it first undergoes a reverse osmosis process similar to what many homes have installed to take impurities out of water. But this takes water out of sap. Once that process is complete the sap is pumped into a big machine where more water is removed and the sap is cooked to the right temperature and consistency. The sap is first run through a filter so the maple sand," can be removed, which is a crystallized sugar that is a part of the cooking process. The sap is then stored in large food safe barrels prior
