The Value of Validation

An inherent human need is having value and being valued by others. Validating those who are closest to you enhances and deepens relationships. Knowing how to validate is a skill that some do not have or avoid using, especially when there are resentments or conflict. To validate another is to show respect and acceptance. When one feels valued by a close friend or intimate partner, it lessens the potential for severe conflict.

It is always good to

have a simple definition to start learning a new skill. According to HPRC-online.org,

"...answering a way that shows the other person you believe their experience

or statement is valid." It seems simple. Yet many of us chronically invalidate others without even knowing it. For some it is not in our nature to let someone know we care about them and that they are valued and understood. It takes a conscious effort, especially while in an argument, to validate another's viewpoint or emotional state. I hate to say this but it is easier to defend and try to prove our point is correct rather than let the other person know that they may have a valid point or idea.

So why is it difficult to acknowledge another's view or feeling? When a conflict reaches a certain point, we stop listening and instead go into defense mode of our view. Our ears shut and our mouth opens. When I work with couples I will state that when a conflict reaches that state, they are being irrational and oblivious to the other person. Another difficulty in acknowledging another value is many of us

did not grow up with this validation from parents, loved ones, or peers. We inherently felt not valued and did not learn the skill of how to identify another's feeling state and accept it. This can lead to misunderstanding or rejection by the other party.

To validate another person you must fully hear and not make assumptions. A good skill is called active listening. Basically this is having your full attention focused on the conversation. Repeat what the person said in your own language. Or ask questions if you are not sure you fully

comprehend what they are saying (clarifying questions). Once you have done this, tell them that you understand and they have a legitimate reason or feeling to be as they are. You don't have to necessarily agree with everything they say but by letting them know you care and are trying to understand versus trying to convince them that their view is wrong can go a long way to finding a solution to the issue.

Another critical step is expressing or showing empathy. Empathy is not sympathy. Empathy is attempting to fully comprehend and feel or at least identify where the other person is at emotionally. Expressing genuine empathy and validation will go a long way to deescalating an argument and enhancing the connection with your friend or loved one.

Validation, active listening, expressing empathy, these are all skills that can be learned. But you must consciously practice them in order for this style of interaction becomes natural and second nature. Once you can achieve this as your "go to" style of communication, I assure you difficult conversations or the potential for conflict will decrease, or at least be

minimized.


