town and I just love when people recognize me and say hi.



On 09/06/2020 at approximately 2037, the Officer was dispatched to the Allen Park Motor Lodge on Southfield Rd. for the report that a stolen credit card was used to purchase a room. A short time later the Officer arrived and made contact with the listed people. Upon speaking with them she stated that her mother, the listed victim, had her purse full of her belongings stolen from her home in Detroit. She further stated that she was contacted by Sears informing her that the credit card was attempted to be used at Allen Park Motor Lodge and that's when she called APPD. She further advised that she is in the process of making a report with Detroit for the larceny and that the male that took the items is a distant relative. She identified the listed offender as she further stated that her mother: advised her that he was at her home at approximately 1930 hrs to visit and when he left she noticed her purse was missing with all of her belongings including credit cards inside. She stated that due to her mother being disabled she is her caretaker and the reason she is making the report. She also expressed that she wished for charges to be pursued against for unauthorized use of the credit cards. At this time the Of-

ficer made contact with the listed witness who was the clerk working. Upon speaking with him he stated that a male and a female booked a room there for the week. He further stated that attempted to use a Sears credit card but it was denied. They then used a gold American Express credit card also belonging to them to purchase the room with the total amount being \$431.50. He stated that after speaking with him he refunded the amount to the credit card. He also stated that he put them in room number 118. Upon checking the room it appeared that no one had been in it. The Officer then advised that when or if they return to give APPD a call. He agreed. APPD then cleared at this time. The Officer then advised him he is going to be detained until they verify his identity the Officer then placed handcuffs on him checking them for tightness and double locking them. It

should be noted that it was discovered that he gave us a false name and was in fact identified as another person. Please refer to Officer's report for more information. The Officer then checked inside of the room for any of the stolen items. The Officer located a Discover Mastercard belonging to someone else on the desk against the wall by the TV by his cell phone. He stated he doesn't know anything about the credit card and that it wasn't in his possession. The American Express card used for the room was not recovered. The Sears card was also not recovered. The Officer then got to verify that the male they had detained was the male that had used the credit card to book the room. They positively identified the male. He was then advised he will be under arrest and was then placed into the patrol vehicle. He was then asked to complete a statement form. He agreed and the form will be placed into the detective bureau's box. It should be noted that he was cooperative and stated he had just met and had no involvement at all with the incident. He was released at the scene. The other male was then transported to APPD. He was booked and processed without incident. The felony DNA kit was completed as well. ON THE SIDELINE: CUB KODA, A "BLOCK J," JAPANESE BOMBS AND A BLUE MAILBOX

 Some days my mind wanders.

Normally, I write about one topic, place or memory in my column, but this week, I'm going to let my mind wander.

In the early 1990s, the Arsenio Hall Show was a popular talk show. Every now and again on his show, Arsenio Hall would have a segment devoted to, "Things That Make You Go, Hmmm..."

Well, recently, I've been thinking about a few things that make me go, hmmm.

For instance, did you know there is a World War II Nazi

submarine at the bottom of Lake Michigan? How it got there and/or who or what sunk it is still debated to this day.

Staying on the WWII subject, did you know Japan bombed metropolitan Detroit during the later stages of the war? It's true -- and it's a "shake your head"-type of story. On the border of Farmington and Livonia in the western Detroit suburbs, a Japanese bomb, attached to a balloon, made its way across the Pacific Ocean all the way to Michigan before dropping and exploding near current day Eight Mile Road.

Things that make you go, hmmm...

At the top of Mount Arvon, Michigan's highest point, stands an unusual object. Visitors who make the close to 2,000-foot trek to the summit of Mount

Did you know Lake Michigan has its own underwater Stonehenge? Recently, divers to the undisclosed spot came across multiple giant stones laid out on the bottom of Lake Michigan. According to the divers, the boulders appeared to be purposely placed in specific spots and patterns and not just randomly and naturally strewn about at the bottom of the lake. Divers also said there appeared to be primitive carvings on the

At Jackson High School in Jackson, Michigan, there is a "Block J" from the school's flag that has been to outer space and back. Al Worden, a 1950 graduate of Jackson High School, was a member of the three-man crew

of Apollo 15 that went to the moon. Worden, who piloted the command module, folded the "Block J" and placed it in a pocket on his space suit. Worden not only went to the moon, but he was the first astronaut ever to perform a deep space space-

walk. He's also in the Guinness Book of World Records for being the "Most Isolated Human" during his multiple trips around the moon as the module's pilot. Despite being the farthest away from Earth in recorded human history. Worden and his

"Block J" made it back to the planet safe and sound. The "Block J" that went to the moon and back, now resides in a frame on a wall in Jackson High School.




