On the listed date the Officer was dispatched to the listed location for a disorderly complaint.

While en route the Officer was advised that a male was walking around hotel property, highly intoxicated and refused to leave at the request of staff.

On arrival the officer made contact with him at the front of the hotel. It was apparent by speech and extremely wobbly stance that he was highly intoxicated. While speaking to he stated that he did not have a cell phone to call anyone and he had no way to get a ride home. During the course of my investigation with him he was agitated and uncooperative. He then began to walk away from me toward the back of the Roush Industries building located at 16630 Southfield. He disregarded all commands to stop walking away and began running. Staff also stated that the room was where had originally been earlier in the evening. Officers then requested they return to the hotel in order to assist them with the occupants of the room. I was advised that a group of approximately 15 individuals from the room were making their way down to the parking lot and they were beginning to argue and fight amongst themselves. The Officers observed

the group exiting the hotel lobby into the parking lot it was apparent they were arguing. The Officer exited the vehicle he observed two females in the group screaming at each other. As the females began approaching each other the rest of the group attempted to separate them. The Officer then observed one female close hand strike an unidentified female in the face causing her to fall to the ground. The Officer then began ordering the group to disperse and the Officer grabbed in an attempt to take her into custody. She immediately resisted and the other Officer assisted in escorting to the hood of a vehicle in the hotel parking lot where they attempted to handcuff. She continued to physically resist by pulling her arms away to prevent herself from being handcuffed. As was being placed into handcuffs she kicked the Officer in the left leg. She was then successfully handcuffed (DL/TC) and escorted to Officer's patrol vehicle. She was screaming and being belligerent with Officer's and continued to resist while being escorted to the vehicle kicking the Officer approximately 3 more times in the legs. The Officer then transported them to APPD to be booked for charges. Upon arrival to APPD the Officer observed that the man had vomited in the back of my patrol vehicle and his level of intoxication had become higher. was unable to make clear speech and was struggling to stay awake. The Officer then had APFD dispatched to the scene and they transported him to Beaumont Hospital Dearborn to receive medical attention. He was cited for being a disorderly person. (CIT#177604) and released from custody. Once the woman was secured in the Offi-

cer's patrol vehicle she was transported to APPD. Officers initially were unable to book and process due to her highly agitated and combative state. She continuously called officers "@#%" and refused to identify herself. The Officers then attempted to book and process her for her charges several minutes later. The Officer asked if she was going to fight with officers if her handcuffs were removed and she stated "NO". She was then uncuffed and advised to step up to the booking counter in order for officers to book her. She immediately became uncooperative stating she was not going to do anything until she received a phone call. Both Officers attempted to explain to her that she would be able to make a phone call after she was booked but she continued to refuse to cooperate. The Officer then ordered her to return to the booking cell but she refused and at that time the Officers had to physically escort back into the APPD booking cell. She tensed her body up and resisted officers. While being escorted through the threshold of the cell door she quickly pulled away and swung at officer striking an Officer. 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



There are no auditions held and no experience is necessary! Residents at the community are thrilled to be getting



Thank you for your patience while we make important improvements to Allen Road Culvert over Ecorse Creek in the City of Allen Park.

WHAT'S BEING DONE?

This project is a continuation of a complete culvert removal and replacement.

WHEN WILL WORK TAKE PLACE?

Construction resumed on **Monday, March 29th, 2021** with a closure to Allen Road. The Contractor has resumed work on placement of the second half of the culvert and continuation of the roadway paving. **The project is estimated to be completed by Summer 2021** barring any unforeseen delays or inclement weather.

WHAT SHOULD I EXPECT?

Allen Road will remain closed to through traffic with access to local traffic only. The following detour has been provided:

- **Traffic traveling southbound on Allen Road** – Take westbound Oakwood Boulevard to westbound I-94 to southbound M-39.
- **Traffic traveling northbound on Allen Road** - Take northbound M-39 to eastbound I-94 to eastbound Oakwood Boulevard.

Flaggers will be present as needed during the project. Please use caution when traveling through construction work zones.



Each summer, 80 of the world's most accomplished high school students gather at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT) for the Research Science Institute (RSI). RSI is the first cost-free to students, summer science & engineering program to combine on-campus course work in scientific theory with off-campus work in science and technology research. Participants experience the entire re-

search cycle from start to finish. They read the most current literature in their field, draft and execute a detailed research plan, and deliver conference-style oral and written reports on their findings. RSI scholars first participate in a week of intensive STEM classes with accomplished professors. The heart of RSI is the five week research internship where students conduct individual projects under the tutelage of mentors who are experienced scien-

tists and researchers. During the final week of RSI, students prepare written and oral presentations on their research projects.

Congratulations to junior Donald Liveak on being selected to participate in the Research Science Institute Program, a summer research camp hosted by the Massachusetts Institute of Technology for high school students looking to pursue a career in STEM research.
