

Universal Face Masking to be Required at Allen Park Schools

Superintendent of Allen Park Public Schools Michael Darga announced masking policies for the upcoming school year in a letter on August 17. The letter to the community stated that the universal mask wearing during the 2021-22 school year is an effort to help prevent the spread of Covid-19.

Students and staff will be required to wear masks while indoors, and also on school buses. Face masks will also be required for student athletes. Student athletes can remove the mask while competing but must wear the mask when on the bench.

Also, face masks will be required for all visitors, coaches, and spectators indoors. Darga also stated in the letter that they will continue to follow the guidance of local, state and federal health experts and the district will closely monitor evidence of in school transmissions.

Upon my arrival, the Officers spoke with Home Depot Asset Protection Specialist Reporting Party stated that while working routine floor surveillance on 08/15/2021 at approximately 1825 hours, he observed the Offender in aisle #4 wearing brown pants and a blue shirt with a

yellow safety vest. He stated that, he became suspicious to him due to him selecting a 5.00 gallon bucket of Behr PPI 3050 interior paint as well as a 4.68 gallon bucket of Behr PPI 2400 interior paint and then concealing both items with moving boxes to hide them on his cart. At 1827 hours, he proceeded toward the flooring aisle where he selected two metal seam binders and then exited through the front doors of the business at 1828 hours without attempting to render any form of payment for the concealed merchandise. The employee then identified himself as Home Depot Asset Protection and he was escorted to the Asset Protection office without incident. He then admitted to stealing the recovered merchandise and presented a State of Michigan identification card

belonging to him. He recognized that it did not match the photograph from the identification card presented to him and he eventually disclosed his true identity prior to officer arrival. Upon Allen Park PD arrival, identification and investigation. He was detained (handcuffed, DL/TC) pending. All stolen merchandise was recovered and returned to stock. A total value of stolen & recovered merchandise was \$293.00. Asset Protection report, surveillance photographs, and presented identification card were placed into the Allen Park PD DB tray. They were unable to burn CCTV footage at the time of the incident. The Officer issued citation #76077 for 1. Retail Fraud. He was then released from the scene of the incident.

On 08/13/21 at approximately 0106 hrs while stationary on the southbound Oakwood on ramp to S M-39 monitoring traffic. The Officer observed a gray SUV traveling north on south M-39 and proceed north onto the south Oakwood ramp passing him. At this time the Officer activated his overhead lights and siren and turned around to initiate a traffic stop on the vehicle. When the vehicle got to Oakwood it turned right going east onto Oakwood and then proceeded through the red light to go north onto the Southfield service drive before pulling over on the Southfield service drive just north of Oakwood. At this time the Officer made contact with the driver. The Officer then advised him the reason for the stop and asked him for his drivers license. He passed his drivers license and then began to count his cash from his wallet and then attempted to hand me his cash. The Officer then again asked him for his drivers license which he was then able to provide me. He was identified by his MI drivers license. Upon speaking with him the Officer could smell the odor of an alcoholic beverage coming from his breath. The Officer then asked how much he has had to drink. He stated "Just a little bit". When the Officer asked him to clarify what he meant by a little. He stated he had one beer several hours ago. He then asked him why he had stopped him.

The Officer again advised him that he was traveling the wrong direction on S M-39. He then stated that he was not going the wrong direction. At this time the Officer then asked to step out of the vehicle. He complied. The Officer observed he had to utilize the door and vehicle to maintain his balance as he stepped out of the vehicle. The Officer then asked him to walk to the back of the vehicle to the bumper. He complied. He utilized the vehicle to maintain his balance and while he was standing at the back of the vehicle he observed him to be swaying back and forth. Once at the back of the vehicle the Officer asked if he takes any prescription medications or if he is under a doctors care for anything. He stated no. The Officer then asked if he would perform field sobriety tests. He stated yes. Prior to starting the test the Officer asked if he had anything in his mouth. He stated no. The Officer also visually checked it. The Officer then asked if he has had anything to drink, burped or threw up within the last 15 minutes. He stated no. The Officer started the tests at approximately 0110 hrs. The first test the Officer performed was the Horizontal Gaze Nystagmus test. The Officer explained the test to and completed the three medical checks, resting nystagmus, equal pupil size and equal tracking. Upon completing the test the Officer observed a lack of smooth pursuit in both eyes, distinct and sustained nystagmus at maximum deviation in both eyes and nystagmus prior to 45 degrees in both eyes. After completing the test the Officer scored him a 6 out of 6 for the test. The second test was the walk and turn. The Officer explained the test and demonstrated the test for him. The Officer instructed him to get into the start position while he explained the test. After he completed the test he missed heel to toe, stepped off the line, made an improper turn, used arms

to balance and took an incorrect number of steps. The Officer scored him a 5 out of 8 for this test. The third test was the one leg stand test. The Officer explained and demonstrated the test for him. Upon completing the test he did not follow instructions by keeping both legs straight, arms down by his side and did not count out loud as instructed. During the test he also swayed, used arms to balance and put his foot down. The Officer scored him a 3 out of 4 for this test. The Officer then advised of his PBT rights and asked if he would be willing to take the PBT. He agreed and it registered a .195 at approximately 0125 hrs. Based on the listed statements/observations the Officer placed him under arrest for OWI placing handcuffs on him checking them for tightness and double locking them. He was then secured into the patrol vehicle. The gray 2020 Cadillac XT6 was towed and impounded to the Allen Park impound lot. Tow tag number 589. Due to the vehicle not being registered to him it was entered into LEIN as impounded and was then transported to the Allen Park Police Department. Once at the station the Officer read him the chemical breath test rights verbatim from the DI-177 form and he agreed to take a breath test. The required fifteen minute observation period began at approximately 0205 hrs. After the observation period the Officer administered the chemical breath test. The result of the first test was .19 at 0223 hrs. The result of the second test was .19 at 0226 hrs. He was then processed and booked without incident. The DI-177 form was entered into LEIN by Lt.



ON THE SIDELINE: LITTLE LEAGUE BASEBALL MEMORIES, ALL-STARS AND GAME-ENDING STRIKEOUTS

Like many people in Michigan, I've been following the success of the Taylor North Little League All-Star baseball team and its run to a state title and a Great Lakes Regional championship. With their regional crown, the Taylor North All-Stars qualified for the Little League World Series in Williamsport, Pennsylvania.

For the past two weeks, Taylor North has been playing in the World Series in a two-loss elimination tournament against 15 of the best Little League All-Star baseball teams from throughout the nation. At press time, Taylor North was one of only four All-Star squads left in the tournament with an unbeaten 2-0 record. Taylor North defeated Florida's Little League All-Star state champion 8-0 in its opening game in Williamsport. In its second game, Taylor North beat the Texas Little League All-Star state champion 6-5. As of press deadline, Taylor North needed three more wins to be crowned Little League World Series champions.

The state of Michigan has had only one Little League baseball World Series champion in the history of the tournament. In 1959, the Hamtramck Little League All-Star team captured a World Series title for the Great

Lakes State's only national championship.

Watching Taylor North advance through the state tournament, followed by regional competition and finally World Series games, reminded me of my youth. When I was 12-years-old (which is the approximate age group for Little League baseball) I was selected for my Little League's All-Star team. I started at third base for the Westland Central North All-Star team. For those unaware, Westland is a Detroit suburb near Livonia and Plymouth. When I was growing up, Westland had a population of just over 90,000. In those days, Westland had four Little League baseball districts — Central North, Central West, Central East and Central South. Everybody back then played Little League baseball. So to be one of 36 12-year-olds, in a city of over 90,000, to start for Westland's four Little League All-Star baseball teams, was a pretty big deal — at least to my young self.

We played our All-Star tournament at Quandt Park (I think that was the name) in Lincoln Park. The field we played our games on was gorgeous and well-manicured, complete with covered dugouts and a grass infield — something I had never played on back in Westland. To my 12-year-old eyes, this was the big-time. The stands on both sides of the field were packed, people also lined the fences all the way down to the outfield area. There was a huge two-story press box behind home plate with an announcer and an official score-

keeper.

There were multiple All-Star teams competing at Quandt Park from numerous cities in the western suburbs and Downriver area. In our first game, my team squared off against a fellow Westland squad, Central East All-Stars. I don't remember the score, but we won. I had an opposite field single and had a clean game defensively with a couple of put outs from my third base position.

In our second game a day later, we lost to the local Lincoln Park All-Star team. To this day, I swear that club had a 6-foot 12-year-old pitcher who threw 90 miles per hour from the mound. He mowed us down. The best hitters in my Little League were no match for this grown man, err, I mean, 12-year-old kid. Despite a furious, last inning comeback where my team cut the deficit to one run, we ran out of gas. Sadly, and it still haunts me to this day, I struck out swinging to end the rally and the game.

I never felt such heartbreak in my young life.

I felt like I let my teammates down. I can still hear the ball hitting the catcher's mitt as I swung and missed ending the game. I can still hear and see the Lincoln Park players and fans erupting in cheers and celebration after the final out.

That was a memorable summer, indeed. Though my team, Westland Central North lost in the second round of the tournament, the Westland Central West All-Star baseball team (which crushed my team in a scrimmage before the

actual tournament) made it all the way to the state semifinals before losing to Petokey 2-1. To this day, I believe it's still the farthest a Westland team has ever gone in the Little League state tournament. I believe a team from Grosse Pointe won the state championship that year.

I still have my powder blue and white Westland Central North All-Star ball cap. It sits prominently, dirt and sweat stains and all, on a shelf near my desk in my "man cave" at home.

Around a decade ago, when I randomly happened to be in the area, I drove by the

park where my Little League baseball All-Star drama played out all those years ago. The complex looked the same as I remembered it as a young man. As I pulled into the parking lot and saw the field, I felt an ache in my stomach. Despite almost 35 years later, the pain of striking out to end the All-Star game still lingered deep down inside.

I remained friends throughout high school and even into college with most of the guys on that All-Star team. Our starting pitcher and best player ended up playing Division I college baseball at EMU and spent a few years play-

ing professionally in the Toronto Blue Jays organization. I recently found out our starting second baseman is now a doctor at Walter Reed Hospital near Washington, D.C. Our second best player, a first baseman/pitcher, became a decorated Westland Firefighter, receiving multiple awards for heroism in the line of duty. He passed away in a tragic boating accident when he was in his late 20s. I'm still not over that incident.

Good luck Taylor North Little League All-Star baseball team. Go and win it all. Enjoy every second.



The Downriver Central Dispatch (DCD) and the Allen Park Police Department wants to inform the community and persons we serve that the end of 3G wireless connection is rapidly approaching. Wireless carriers will discontinue support of 3G devices in 2022. Older style 3G models of Tracfonos, flip phones, Jitterbugs, etc. are going to start falling off networks sooner than later. 3G devices will not only be disabled from normal use - they will also be unable to dial or call 9-1-1. So even if you or a loved one has been keeping a 3G device for 9-1-1

purposes only, eventually it will no longer work at all.

How do you identify if you have a 3G device?

• Check the phone's IMEI (International Mobile Equipment Identity)
 • IMEI should be available on a smartphone in the "About" tab of settings
 • IMEI from the phone's keypad by pressing: *#06#
 • Once you have your IMEI number go to: <https://www.in1ei.info>
 • This site will provide details on the phone and the network it is set up for. 3G networks use frequencies at 900Mhz or 2100Mhz.





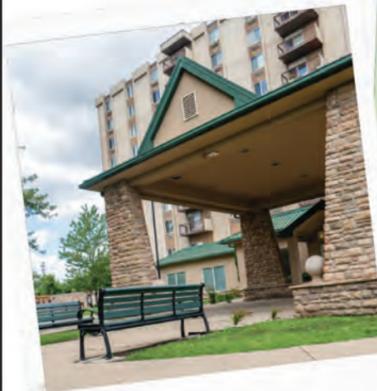
