Cindy Elliott named president of IHA medical group

Elliott earned her Bachelor of Science degree in Nursing and Master of Health Administration from Eastern Michigan University. She has completed the Healthcare Executive course with Harvard's School of Public Health and is a Fellow with the American College of Healthcare Executives. She was an adjunct professor at Eastern Michigan University and has served on several boards, including EMU's Physician Assistant Program Advisory Board and the United Way of Washtenaw County.

IHA, the medical group for Saint Joseph Mercy Health System and a member of Trinity Health, has appointed Cindy Elliott, RN, FACHE, to be its next president. Today's announcement follows a unanimous vote from the IHA Governing Board and the Trinity Health Michigan Board, and Elliott's successful leadership in the interim role for the past several months.

Elliott becomes just the third president in IHA's 27-year history, after Mark LePage, MD, and the late William Fileti.

"Cindy has been part of the IHA family for more than 22 years and was the clear choice to lead Trinity Health's largest multi-specialty med-

ical group," said Rob Casalou, president and CEO of Trinity Health Michigan. "We are fortunate to have a leader with Cindy's skill, vision and values helping forge the future of care for communities here in Michigan."

Elliott has extensive clinical and operational experience over her distinguished 30-year career. He learned about the position in Chelsea, did his research, and was familiar with Julie Helber as she was formerly in Saline. Mr. Ceo felt as though the position was a good fit for him.

It was during this part of the conversation that I became very impressed. I was trying to understand how difficult handling a group of middle school children was. Mr. Ceo was not weary, as I imagined anyone might be. Middle school is full of big emotions and limited testing. Mr.

Ceo was the opposite of weary, he was enthusiastic. It was clear he loves working with kids and this particular age group. I am a reporter but I am also a Mom. I always imagine, when interviewing someone, what I would want for my own kids. Would I want Mr. Ceo in a leadership position at a school for my children? Yes 100%. It's clear he loves kids, he loves what I imagine is a challenging age group and he wants to provide them with his very best. He explained that this age is super fun to be around because the kids are full of energy and developing their own world view.

I asked Mr. Ceo what he hoped to ac-

complish at Beach and he explained that he believes Beach is the best middle school in the state. He stated that he wants to keep the school moving in the right direction. He will provide minor tweaks to keep learning, growing and improving but his goal is to make certain the school continues in the right direction. It's clear that Mr. Ceo has the utmost respect for the job as his predecessor did. Don't expect major upheaval at the middle school. But do expect your children to be in the hands of someone who really loves his job and is passionate about creating a great learning environment for the students.

Dexter City Council Meeting

The meeting began with the Approval of the Minutes. The meeting minutes were quickly approved without any changes.

Pre-arranged Participation:

1. Partners in Architecture – 3515 Broad St. Presentation. Stephan Lechman from Partners in Architecture, provided a presentation of the new city hall project. He went over the floor plans and discussed the changes that will be made. He gave the plan for the scope of work including maintenance needs. He showed us the plans for the exterior. He went over the construction budget estimate. He also gave a proposed schedule. Council members gave input and asked questions.

E. Approval of Agenda. Zach suggested M5 be postponed due to a council member not being present. If M5 is removed the Mayor asks that 7 be removed. The agenda was approved minus M5 and M7.

H. Non-arranged Participation: Matt Williams from JanPro introduced himself during non-arranged participation.

I. Communications:

1. Upcoming Meeting List

J. Reports:

1. Public Services - Tim Stewart gave the report. He is unsure about the timing of Christmas lights. He did mention there was a problem that should be fixed with the leaf machine, with Dan Schlaff stepping in to help with questions as needed.

2. Community Development Manager – Michelle Aniol provided her report and answered several questions. There was some discussion regarding the conditional zoning issue mentioned in Michelle's report. The issue will be before planning in December.

3. There was a sheriff report provided. Someone is impersonating a Washt-

enaw County Sheriff on the phone. Nobody will contact you on the phone and ask for money to get out of trouble. It's someone trying to commit fraud. Call the non-emergency line and report the call. Do not send anyone money. The issue with LaFontaine delivery drivers unloading cars in an unsafe way was discussed. Shop with a Cop is coming up in early December.

5. City Manager Report – Justin Breyer gave his report.

6. Mayor Report – Shawn Keough discussed an event with children. The kids gave feedback on park ideas. The kids like the idea of ping pong tables. The fire board adopted the spending plan budget. Dexter's costs will go up and was not in the budget last July. Dexter is not the only community that will see an increase. Dexter Township will incur more costs as well. Donna wanted to know the reason for the increase. The Mayor explained that they are ramping up to four full time firefighters. They went from two stations manned full time to three manned full time.

7. Council Member Reports;

Consent Agenda: was approved.

M. New Business-Consideration and Discussion of;

1. Consideration of: Application for Amendment to Conditional Rezoning Agreement for 7714 Ann Arbor St. Encore Theatre. The Encore theater is asking to eliminate voluntary conditions. Dan Cooney spoke and explained why the desire to change happened. The motion passed.

2. Consideration of: Text Amendment to the Zoning Ordinance for Plug-In Electric Vehicle (PEV) Stations. Michelle explained the amendment. It will establish regulations that will allow PEV stations and create appropriate guidelines. Zach asked several questions and offered some suggestions on the wording. The mo-

tion carried.

3. Consideration of: Amendment to City Council Rules; Zach provided an overview of the changes, which are specific to how open seats on council are filled. The motion carried.

4. Consideration of: First Street Park Sidewalk Connection and Project Recommendation from Parks and Recreation Commission Councilmember Michels bright up some concerns. The Mayor stated that he wanted to see how the budget pans out. The motion was made to postpone. The motion carried.

6. Discussion of: Rental Inspection Ordinance and Property Maintenance Code; Looking at the first draft of zoning ordinance updates in the next few months. This will likely go in front of the public in 2023. If it is determined to be a council priority there will be a push to get it done faster. The mayor expressed concern for safety for renters. The mayor believes most landlords have safe structures but for those that don't, the Mayor would like to encourage safer conditions for renters. Councilmember Michels is in favor of the mayor's suggestions, citing that the role of local government is health and safety. He would also like to include short-term rental regulations. The firechief is in favor of it and brought up the question of who is qualified to enforce the code.

N. Council Comments; Zach brought up the idea of a cost recovery ordinance, which is included in insurance and a good way to start equipment funding. Congrats to Zach's exchange student who earned her varsity letter in football. Donna expressed how grateful she was for Alex, and what a pleasure it was to work with him in committee. Happy Thanksgiving!

P. Adjournment. The meeting adjourned.

MC Patrick Rogers expressed thanks



As I got close to Ford Field and was about to be swept away with the traffic, I strained my eyes looking for Dave in the crowd of people walking toward the stadium. Then, in a scene straight out of “Chariots of Fire,” I saw Dave emerge from the crowd, shuttle passes in hand, jogging at a quick pace, toward my barely moving vehicle. We met eyes. I swear I heard the “Chariots of Fire” movie theme song in the distance as he neared my SUV. I threw open my passenger door and he jumped in. In a moment of providence, as soon as Dave hopped in my vehicle, traffic eased up and I was able to “Steve McQueen” my way through the downtown Detroit streets to our designated parking garage and our waiting shuttle.

The rest of the day went pretty smoothly. The shuttle got us to Ford Field with no trouble dropping us off near the stadium’s press entrance. With official press passes in hand, we got through each checkpoint and security area before taking the stadium elevator to the top level of Ford Field and the press box area.

It was fun hobnobbing and rubbing should-

ers with local and national sport writers and TV personalities in the large press box area. It was cool having a pregame Thanksgiving meal with everyone and sitting at a table and talking shop with people I had either watched on TV or read in the local newspapers for years.

The game went as everyone predicted with a Lions blowout loss to the Packers. After covering the game, Dave and I took the elevator down to the locker room area of Ford Field. We waited with other sports writers, reporters and TV crews to enter the Packers locker room. After a few minutes, the locker room door flung open and the press was allowed in. It was pretty cool walking by quarterback Aaron Rodgers as he was being interviewed by a mob of reporters at his locker. I remember linebacker Clay Matthews also nearby being swamped by the press at his locker.

Dave found his interviewee, defensive tackle Cullen Jenkins (Belleville, CMU) and proceeded to get down to business asking his questions. As Dave conducted his interview, I surveyed the crowded and noisy locker room looking for my “tar-

get” — rookie offensive guard T.J. Lang (Birmingham Brother Rice, EMU). I finally found him in a far corner of the room. He was quietly taking off his shoulder pads. No one was around him. I introduced myself and started my interview. He was so laid back and friendly. Just a young guy, and recent EMU graduate, living his dream of playing in the NFL. By the end of our interview, I glanced over my shoulder and noticed multiple other sports writers and reporters now standing behind me taking notes and reaching their tape recorders closer to hear Lang’s answers to my questions. Of course, Lang would go on to become an All-Pro guard and longtime fixture on the Green Bay offensive line and later end his stellar career with his home state Lions. I always joke to myself that I was probably his first interview as an NFL player.

After our interviews were over, Dave and I headed out of the stadium to the waiting shuttle. Later that night, we would write our stories.

It was a Thanksgiving Day I’ll never forget. Happy Thanksgiving everyone.

WRRMA's Communitywide Campaign to Improve Curbside Recycling

Grant from Michigan EGLE & The Recycling Partnership Reduces Contamination by 42% with a Nationally Recognized Cart Tagging Campaign

Together, residents of The Washtenaw Regional Resource Management Authority (WRRMA) were able to reduce non-recyclable materials found in single family residential recycling carts by 42% during the recent Feet on the Street cart-tagging recycling education campaign. The project aimed to improve the quality of materials residents in the Authority's seven municipalities - Ann Arbor Township, Dex-

ter, Saline, Scio Township, Pittsfield Township, Ypsilanti, and Ypsilanti Township. An audit of recycling from WRRMA communities showed a contamination rate of 19.5% prior to the campaign. After cart-tagging was completed, another audit showed a contamination reduction to 11.3%. Feet on the Street is The Recycling Partnership's nationally recognized curbside recycling education program, providing

residents customized and real-time feedback on their curbside recycling. For WRRMA, the goal was to reduce the number of items not accepted for curbside recycling and improve the quantity and quality of materials being recycled.

"We were really happy to see a reduction in the number of tags for contaminants like plastic films, and the audits showed a decrease in bagged recycling and food waste in curbside recycling. Those items cause a lot of issues at the recycling processing facilities," said Theo Eggermont, WRRMA Manager. "The effort showed that most residents want to recycle the right way and providing personalized feedback on what should and should not go into the curbside recycling bin can allow more materials to be turned into new products, keep valuable materials out of the landfill, and increase the value of the recycling stream."

Over eight weeks, recycling detectives walked recycling routes to "tip and tag" - tip the lids of recycling carts and tag carts with non-recyclable materials or recyclable items prepared the wrong way (i.e., bagged). These carts had an "Oops Tag" attached to it which informed the resident what item(s) needed to be removed. The most common item carts were tagged for was plastic bags and plastic film. While plastic bags and film are recyclable at local drop-offs (often in major grocery and retail stores), they cannot be collected with curbside recycling. At materials recovery facilities, these items cause major issues by tangling in the machinery, slowing operations and creating safety risks for workers.

For WRRMA, this

campaign was possible from a grant received by the Michigan Department of Environment, Great Lakes and Energy, and The Recycling Partnership, a nonprofit organization that works with cities nationwide to transform their recycling programs.

"The Recycling Partnership, in collaboration with Michigan EGLE, is proud of the results accomplished by WRRMA during the recent Feet on the Street recycling education campaign," said Cassandra Ford, Community Program Manager at The Recycling Partnership. "The results achieved in this year's recycling education campaign show the power of partnership and how impactful regional recycling initiatives can be when all stakeholders are part of the solution."

WRRMA would like to thank its residents for participating in this campaign and keeping our recycling carts full of clean and dry recyclable materials. To maintain this success, we ask residents to continue to place only recyclable materials in their carts, including aluminum and steel cans, food and beverage cartons, paper products (such as newspapers, mail, and flattened cardboard and paperboard), and empty plastic bottles, jars, and jugs. Some communities accept glass while others do not, so WRRMA recommends checking the Waste Wizard recycling

Some items that cannot be recycled curbside include plastic bags, paper towels, electrical equipment, batteries, and clothing. These items often get mixed into recycling carts because of "wish-cycling," or the hope that they can be recycled. While well-intentioned, non-recyclable materials cause serious issues and ultimately don't end up being recycled.

The Recycling Part-

nership initiative aligns with EGLE's "Know It Before You Throw It" recycling education campaign featuring the Recycling Raccoon Squad. The campaign is promoting best practices and emphasizes that recycling materials saves energy, reduces water use, decreases greenhouse gases, conserves resources, and translates into local jobs.

This approval is contingent on the proposed land division being recorded within 60 days after the zoning map amendment approvals so that a single site does not have two zoning classifications; the cost of the conduit will be paid from ARPA funds and use of any ARPA funds will be determined at a later date; the purchase of conduit from Midwest Energy Cooperative for \$25,000 and authorizes the Supervisor of Lyndon Township to execute the Bill of Sale; Schedule a public hearing to increase the Sugarloaf Lake Special Assessment District for one year; Quote from Toby's Painting for \$5,000.00; Quote from Taylor Electric for \$7,287.60; Allocate \$20,000 for remodeling the Boardroom and \$5,000 for the sign in the Public Improvement budget. 
