





"Readers always write."





> continued from page 9 Meals - There are so many different options for puzzle toys now. Some of them are meant to hold your dog's entire breakfast or dinner and will dispense the kibble a little ad a time as your dog pushes the puzzle around. Some are meant to be interactive with you. These puzzles usually have compartments where you can put treats and then cover them with a flap or lid of some sort. It's a good idea to sit with your dog while he does these puzzles so you can help if he gets frustrated and also so you can prevent him from eating the pieces. Some of my favorite puzzle toys are made by Kong, West Paw, and Orbee.

4. Tuggy Games Playing tug is excellent exercise and is a really great game as long as there is clear structure to the game. The important skills your dog needs to play tug safely are a "drop" cue, a "get it" cue, and the skill of grabbing the toy with his mouth (rather than your hand or clothing). When playing tug with your dog, keep the rounds off tug short - 30-45 seconds at most. You can alternate the way you pause between rounds of tug by asking for a "drop" and following that up with a treat or by letting your dog have full possession of the toy for a moment. Be gentle with your tugging pressure. It's a good idea to let your dog be the



one to decide how hard to pull. Another good rule of thumb, to protect your dog's body, is to let your dog keep his feet on the floor during tug sessions.

These games should be fun for both you and your dog. If either of you are not having fun, try a different game! As your dog learns that these new games are available, you may even see him start to use his body language to ask you for game time.
