My Irish/English ancestors made bronzing like a bottle of oil from the 80s impossible. When getting a spray tan became an option, I secretly feared turning a hideous shade of orange. spotted a small business in Chelsea supporting other small business owners in Chelsea; I decided to face my fears and give it a try. I made an appointment with the Glow Bar for a spray tan.

Balanced Living by Brio Living Services Offers Holistic Approach to Health

Chelsea Retirement Community Pilots Enhanced Wellness Experience for Residents

Brio Living Services announces the pilot of a new branded health and wellness program at Chelsea Retirement Community (CRC), its flagship campus in Chelsea, Michigan. Balanced Living by Brio Living Services will kick off in January 2024 for older adults across CRC's continuum of care, including Independent Living, Assisted Living and Memory Care, and short- and long-term skilled care.

Balanced Living is designed with The Seven Dimensions of Wellness as its guide, according to Tylene Costello, Director of Lifestyle and Health at CRC. "Balanced Living is a holistic approach that will integrate each of these seven facets, including Environmental, Intellectual, Vocational, Emotional, Spiritual, Physical, and Social wellness. Studies show that if one dimension is neglected for too long, it can adversely affect a person's health. Through Balanced Living, we aim to provide opportunities for our residents to explore all dimensions of wellness to contribute to their own quality of life."

The program's mission statement is: Balanced Living bridges connections for a service model that elevates and creates holistic resident experiences. We foster a collaborative approach to plan our lifestyle offerings with our expert team invested in resident well-being. By breaking down the silos, Balanced Living cultivates life enriching programs and experiences!

Brio Living Services partners with National Institute

for Fitness and Sport (NIFS) and employs NIFS fitness experts, including Costello, in many of Brio's residential senior living communities. "As our fitness management partner, we will utilize NIFS' resources and expertise to bring this framework to CRC," said Costello. "Assuming we see positive results from this pilot at CRC, we will expand Balanced Living to our other Brio communities as well."

"At Brio we believe the field of aging services must grow beyond the traditional 'activities calendar' and embrace the desire of residents to experience meaningful engagement, holistic wellness, and lifelong learning," said Brio's Chief of Residential Services, Nicole Maag. "Our vision at Brio is 'a world in which all are empowered to age well.' Balanced Living furthers this vision by creating environments and fostering opportunities for residents to grow, experience, and engage!"

"Through the Balanced Living program, NIFS team members will collaborate with our Life Enrichment and Spiritual Life team members, as well as Dining," said Kathy Russell, Executive Director for CRC, The Pines, and The Cedars of Dexter communities. "Together, we will engage our residents with a variety of activities across the seven dimensions and create a cohesive wellness experience for our residents."

Russell added, "The social and spiritual part of wellness is also a key component of Balanced Living and will set CRC apart from wellness programs at many other communities."

Cristina Manly, CRC's Director of Sales, agreed. "The program not only enriches the overall wellness of our residents, but it also provides the ability to be engaged through social connections. You feel part of a community, a family, which encompasses who we are as an organization and a community."

CRC's state-of-the-art McMullen Wellness Center, completed in 2019, is a showcase for a variety of physical health activities for CRC residents, including swimming and water aerobics, fitness classes, a walking track, and NuStep machines. The McMullen Wellness Center receives an average of between 1,400 and 1,600 resident visits per month.

Balanced Living will kick off in January 2024 at CRC. Each month will have its own theme that team members across the campus can plug into as they plan their activities. "January's theme is Fresh Start in Balanced Living," said Costello. "Each area of campus will have a kick-off party. Some of the activities will include an emotional wellness presentation, blood pressure checks, and a spa day with massages."

Said Russell, "We are excited about ways that Balanced Living will enhance overall wellness for residents across our campus. Residents can expect to see a similar wellness experience across our continuum of care. This is important, especially as our residents require more care and move to different care areas of our campus, that they see familiar faces and can continue to enjoy wellness activities that enrich their quality of life."

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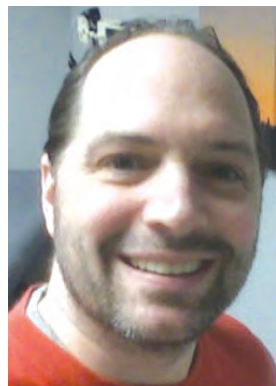

United Way for Southeastern Michigan Announces Two New Grant Opportunities for Washtenaw County Nonprofits

Grants to support families in need, access to resources and equity

United Way for Southeastern Michigan has announced the opening of two significant grant opportunities for nonprofit organizations based in Washtenaw County: the 2024 Responsive Basic Needs Grant and the 2024 Racial Equity Fund Grant. These grants aim to support and empower community-focused initiatives addressing vital needs and foster racial equity in the region.

“At United Way for Southeastern Michigan, we believe in the power of unity to create lasting change. Following our merger in October of 2023, we are proud to continue our commitment to Washtenaw County families and organizations. With the launch of these grants, we are not just funding projects; we are investing in the heartbeat of our communities,” says Tonya Adair, Chief Development, Diversity & Engagement Officer at United Way for Southeastern Michigan. “We aim to support the in-

credible efforts of nonprofits that align with our vision of a more equitable, inclusive, and thriving Washtenaw County. Together, we can address immediate needs and lay the groundwork for systemic change, ensuring every individual can become stable and have opportunities to thrive.”

2024 Washtenaw County Responsive Basic Needs Grant - This competitive grant program targets 501(c)(3) nonprofits based in Washtenaw County with proven programs in emergency food, services for individuals who are unhoused, and benefit navigation support, including Medicaid enrollment. Funding amounts range from \$15,000 to \$40,000 for a six-month period. Eligible organizations, including current and prospective United Way partners, are encouraged to apply. The application period opens on January 3; the deadline for submission is 5 p.m. on January 18.

2024 Washtenaw County Racial Equity Fund Grant - Dedicated to supporting BIPOC-led organizations, the Racial Equity Fund offers unrestricted operational grants and technical assistance. This initiative aims to eliminate racial disparities and promote equitable communities in Southeastern Michigan. By prioritizing the experiences of those affected by systemic oppression, the fund seeks to foster authentic inclusion and equitable access to resources. This year, \$200,000 is available for grants ranging from \$10,000 to \$50,000. Organizations serving and based in Washtenaw County with BIPOC (Black, Indigenous, People of Color) executive leadership are eligible. The application period is identical to the Basic Needs Grant, with applications due by 5 p.m. on January 18.

United Way for Southeastern Michigan has served the region for more than 100

years. Their mission is to mobilize the caring power of Detroit and Southeastern Michigan to improve communities and individual lives in measurable and lasting ways. They

work with hundreds of partners and thousands of donors, advocates, and volunteers to advance equitable communities where households are stable, and children thrive.

They also actively work to ensure equity in communities. Eligible organizations in Washtenaw County are encouraged to apply and join

The items offered had been around a while and she was ready for a change. The items in the store are interesting and cultivated from around

the world. I found a ton of things I’d love to buy but after all the Christmas spending, was trying to be responsible and not get wrapped up in the idea of sale. I selected a lotus flower incense burner priced at \$15. I also grabbed a pack of Lily of the Valley incense handmade in India marked \$5. My daughter found soapstone-carved animals made in Africa for her brother who lived in Africa while in the Peace Corps. The entire time we shopped Laura was giving us extra details about the items we were examining. It was like a free social studies lesson while we shopped. I thoroughly enjoyed it.

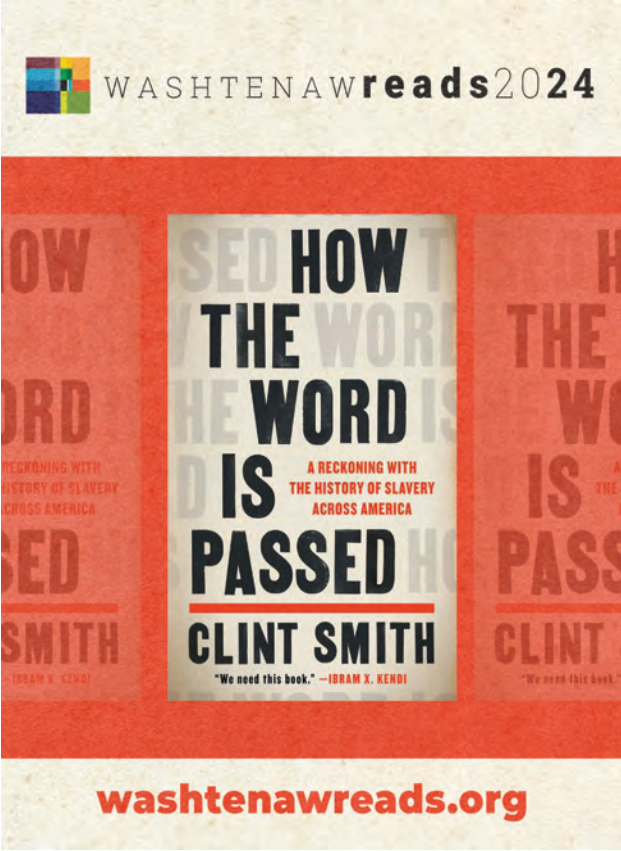

Chelsea District Library (CDL) is encouraging people of all ages to grab a good book this winter through its Hot Reads for Cold Nights (HRCN) winter reading program! From increasing vocabulary, to exercising empathy, to pure entertainment, research has long supported the importance of reading for children, teens, and adults. Reading is even touted as an activity to help keep dementia at bay, according to the Fisher Center for

Alzheimer’s Research Foundation! There is no better time to dive into a good book than winter, and CDL has the perfect incentive to send you reaching for a book instead of a phone!

From December 18 through February 29, read, log, and review books to earn hot prizes like cocoa or tea and superhero themed mugs! HRCN uses the same reading program app as the popular summer reading program, Beanstack. If you participate in the summer program, simply open up your app and login to sign up for the HRCN

winter challenge. If you’ve never participated, visit chelseadistrictlibrary.org/hrcn to learn how. Not a fan of reading apps? Stop by the library to participate on paper instead.

Need a book recommendation to get you started? Why not try the countywide read? Stop by CDL and grab a copy of Clint Smith’s *How the Word Is Passed*, the Washtenaw Reads book choice for 2024. When discussions of removing confederate monuments in his hometown of New Orleans began in 2017, Smith was inspired to

write this book, touted as a “brilliant, vital work” by Kirkus Reviews. Smith’s book takes us around the country, highlighting historic sites and monuments such as Monticello, Galveston Island, Texas (the birthplace of Juneteenth), Confederate cemeteries, and the Whitney Plantation. Along the way, he highlights how nostalgia and miseducation have shaped our country’s collective memory and understanding of race and history. Copies of *How the Word Is Passed* will be available starting January 3.
