

WASHTENAW UNITED HIGH SCHOOL HOCKEY TEAM RESTARTS SEASON

The Washtenaw United High School Girls' Hockey Team restarted their season with a 4-1 victory against Downriver United. The victory marked the first win in program history, improving the team's record to 1-1-0 on the season. The two teams last played on November 5th, 2020, with Downriver skating away with a 3-1 win. The season had been shutdown shortly after the November 5th game due to COVID restrictions, until practices were allowed to restart on January 16th. This was the first game back for both teams after games were allowed to resume by the Michigan

Department of Health on February 8th.

Washtenaw came out to a quick start in the first period, outshooting Downriver 10-5, however the first period closed with no scoring from either side. At 2:18 into the second period, Jillian Eggleston (Dexter, '22) opened the scoring on the power play with a shot from the left point, thanks to a screen in front of the Downriver goaltender provided by Sydney Clark (Saline, '25) and a deflection off a Downriver defender. Cecilia Henriksen (Chelsea, '24) netted what would be the first of her three goals on the night with 7:57 to go in the second. Downriver pulled

within 1 less than 2 minutes later.

Washtenaw would spend most of the remainder of the 2nd period shorthanded. Linzy Costella (Manchester '21) was a 4 minute boarding penalty shortly after Downriver's goal, followed by a checking penalty on Rylee Kennedy (Milan, '24). Washtenaw was able to kill both penalties, and pick up their third goal with 20 seconds to go in the period. Henriksen rounded out the scoring in the 3rd period with an empty net goal with 1:23 to go in the game.

Goaltender Julia Scarcella (Saline, '22) turned aside 19 Downriver shots in a solid

Washtenaw United continued their winning ways with a 5-4 victory over the Skyline-Huron High School (Skyron) combined team on Saturday at Veteran's Memorial Rink in Ann Arbor. This was the United's 3rd win in a row since returning to game play last week.

After a scoreless first period, Kate Hurlley of Skyron knocked in the rebound after a shot off the faceoff to United goaltender Julia Scarcella's (Saline, '22) right. The two teams would combine for 5 goals in the second period. Skyron's lead would not last long with the United scoring 3 goals in a less than 4 minute stretch. United's leading scorer, Cecilia Henriksen (Chelsea, '24) scored her 5th of the season with a backhand rebound past Skyron goalie Jillian Cook. Senior Captain Linzy Costella (Manchester, '21) wristed a shot

from the top of the circle past Cook, followed by Sydney Clark's (Saline, '25) first goal of the season, tapping in a rebound after a shot from the point. Skyron got the final goal of the period, a power play goal, with 4:25 to go in the period.

Skyron tied the game 3-3 2:35 into the third period, on goal by Salsabeel Hodge, quickly followed by Henriksen's second goal of the night giving the United the lead once again. Henriksen picked up a loose puck in the neutral zone, skating down the left side, and put one past Cook's blocker. Khaleela Hodge would score her second of the night tying the game up for Skyron.

Late game heroics were provided by Junior defenseman Jillian Eggleston (Dexter, '22). Eggleston picked up the puck at the red line, skated around 2 Skyron players, and shot the puck past the Skyron goaltender. "The coaches have

been encouraging me to skate the puck more", Eggleston said. "I picked up the puck in the neutral zone after skating around the two defenders. I realized I had an open shot, and I just took it." With a minute to go, Skyron pulled their goalie for the extra attacker. Scarcella made some timely saves, preserving the win for the United.

"I thought Henriksen and Eggleston had really strong games today", said United Assistant Coach Sue McDowell. "Cecilia's two goals, the first starting the 3 goal streak in the second period, the second giving us the 4-3 lead in the third. Along with the game winner, Jillian picked up a couple assists with shots from the point. Riley Malloy (Saline, '24) really helped us defensively today, especially in the third period, blocking shots and being physical in front of our net."

menu, I noticed a slightly higher end or more innovative ingredient list. The Jolly Pumpkin features mostly pizza and a few sandwiches. But the pizza isn't your standard pizza. Pizzas called Butter-nut Squash and Kale and Sunchoke are on the menu, rather than the typical meatlovers. Toppings include; goat cheese and smoked mozzarella rather than cheese and extra cheesy. This is not the pizza place for eight hungry fifteen year old boys. We decided to try a few things since there were a few of us eating. My six year old opted for the kids cheese pizza, I went with the burger, and my husband and son split a mushroom pizza.

Dine in, is currently available, but Jolly Pumpkin offers on-line carryout ordering, which I appreciate. We actually called in our order, the person taking it asked how far away we were so they

could time cooking and it was ready and hot as we arrived.

No surprise, my daughter liked her cheese pizza. Big happy surprise for me, my burger was cooked properly. I asked for medium and got medium. Normally, I get well when I ask for medium, so I was braced for a dry, well done burger. But I got a delicious perfectly medium burger! I was very happy. My family jumped in and indulged in my fries, which were a hit. I let everyone try my burger, except my six year old, who refused because it, "doesn't look like McDonald's." Thank goodness! The pimento cheese and togarashi aioli, perfectly cooked burger on Challah bread, was a perfect combination. It was one of the best burgers, I've ever had. It was so large, I still have half of it in the fridge, which is good because writing about it is making me want another. My husband

and son both enjoyed the mushroom pizza. There are no leftovers. I did get a bite, but not enough to really go into detail. I think the goat cheese made it stand out as an extra delicious bite.

My twenty-four-year-old, who attended the University of Michigan, gave a great review. He's been to the Ann Arbor location before and explained that it's a great date place. It's not too expensive but also not cheap. It's casual but the food is good, and as a Michigan craft beer fan, he enjoys the beer selection. We did not partake in the beer, because I was working. But there was a chocolate Stout that caught my eye. Maybe when I am able to get the vaccine, I'll come to visit and give it a try. Who knows, maybe after an in-person City Council meeting, I'll want to sit down and have a beer and I'll stop by to grab one. That world seems unimaginable right now but is something I look forward to.

My family and I very much enjoyed the visit and would recommend the Jolly Pumpkin. Like Michigan craft beer, its menu features a step up from average ingredients for a step up in flavors. The online ordering option is nice for those of us who are still at high risk and waiting. The service was excellent, both times, as was the food. Famous Fish Fry Goes Mobile at St. Mary Volunteers Create "Drive By Fish Fry" to Protect Those At-Risk and Meet Growing Fundraising Needs

As area non-profits and churches begin Lent this week, two words come to mind: "fish fry."

Lenten fish fry season is upon us, and this year it arrives with extra suffering. At St. Mary in Pinckney, older parishioners who have quarterbacked traditional fish dinners for the past 25 years simply cannot risk it this year. At the same time, faith-based organizations are in dire need of fundraising.

To meet the need and protect high-risk volunteers, St. Mary turned to school families who are now learning how to fish fry "on the fly." Through the passing of the torch, the Drive By Fish

Fry was born.

Local retired pharmacist and St. Mary parishioner Bob Phipps, who is currently volunteering to help the Livingston County Health Dept. administer the vaccine, runs the fish fry for six weeks every year, "netting" tens of thousands of dollars for St. Mary parish and school. Phipps, 64, former owner of Pinckney Pharmacy along with Hamburg and Fowlerville Pharmacies for nearly 40 years, is too young to be considered in the high-risk age range for an early vaccine.

"We knew we needed creativity and open minds this year without many of our regular volunteers and with the added challenges,"

said Phipps. "We had to account for everything from drive-thru traffic flow to plexi-glass, and even childcare to recruit new volunteers," he added. "We tackled all this while making sure to maintain our primary goal, which is to serve a great dinner for a good cause. It's been uplifting to see our school community step up, and we are coming out stronger for it."

Bob and his wife Cathy have been producing the fish fry with the St. Mary Men's Club for 15 years. She is a caterer and runs the kitchen while he coordinates 30-some volunteers who show up each week.

"We expect the draw to be closer, con-

sidering the times," said Phipps. That hasn't always been the case. Fish fry customers have visited St. Mary from as far as Canada, Ireland, Mexico, Japan, Saudi Arabia, and Ireland. "This year we are grateful to just feed our regulars."

Drive By Fish Fry starts February 19th, and runs through March 26th. Open for business Lenten Fridays from 4 to 7pm, each dinner produces around 500 meals. With this in mind, the St. Mary crew planned for carryout only production, social distancing and safety, and looked for new volunteers.

Luckily they didn't have to look far. St. Mary school parents stepped up to help with

operations, volunteering, cleaning, and of course in the kitchen to cook that famous fish fry the community loves.

Amy Berry jumped into the effort to help feed the community as new head chef. A school mom who previously worked as a professional chef for the Detroit Athletic Club, she was an ideal fit.

"I hope to serve a great fish dinner that becomes a destination for good food, good people and a worthy cause," said Berry. "The Lenten fish fry is up against more competition since every restaurant in town is primarily take out. We are ready for it. As they say... I'm 'St. Mary

proud' we came together to overcome the challenges of our time."

With all hands on deck and faith on their side, the team at St. Mary is trying all things new, including their fish supplier. Detroit-based Caramagno Foods, a family owned fish distributor since 1910, supports Lenten fish dinners as part of their business model and Irish Catholic heritage.

"It's been a struggle and we are glad to be working through it," said Denis Carmody, a truck driver for Caramagno who will deliver fish for six weeks to the St. Mary crew.

"We depend on our fish fry volunteers and we are thankful they are embracing the call."



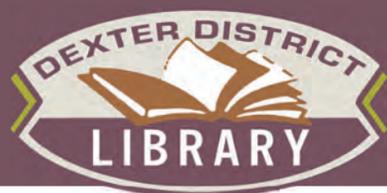


