

Creekside Intermediate School Wins Silver Michigan School Wellness Award (Again!)

Michigan schools recognized with School Wellness Awards for the 2019-20 school year.

Per their website (swa.mihealthtools.org), the School Wellness Award (SWA) recognizes schools that are making significant policy and environmental improvements in their environment related to healthy eating, physical activity, and tobacco-free lifestyles. Originally known as the Healthy School Environment Recognition Program, this award was established in 2006 and has undergone several iterations to its present title, which was re-established in 2011.

The application process includes self-evaluation of activities and accomplishments, including submitting a Success Story. This is Creekside's: With a focus on mental health, Creekside has designed a quiet space called the Zen Den. This area is available

for any student who is struggling emotionally, giving them a safe place to calm down and regain control before rejoining their class. It was implemented in response to a growing need for social-emotional learning, emotion regulation, and stress management for our students. It also provides life-long skills. The Zen Den is part of an elective course about mindfulness called Kind Mindz, and is available for the fifth- and sixth-graders at Creekside. Kind Mindz focuses on Mindfulness and stretching. The Zen Den is a calm and welcoming space where students and staff can practice mindfulness and regulate their mind and body.

We have soft lighting, music and lots of resources like yoga mats, pillows, different types of comfortable seating, coloring, etc. Students are welcome to visit the space when they need, our mindfulness flex classes are held in the

space, and community education holds yoga classes after school for Creekside students. Students have loved the new classes available during and after school, and teachers have noticed improvements in mood.

The classes are led by a sixth-grade teacher and a fifth-grade teacher. Curriculum was developed by the teachers, and both the principal and assistant principal helped identify a space and obtain materials.

Creekside Principal Tammy Reich said, "Creekside staff value educating the whole child and this recognition from the state is greatly appreciated. Thanks to lifetime fitness teachers Fred Ligrow and Angie Scott, who spearheaded the Wellness Award application process and project implementation, and to Elizabeth Melvin and Narda Black, who run the mindfulness classes."

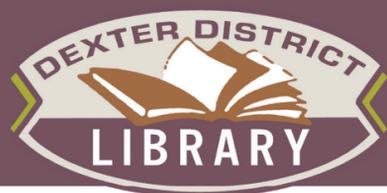

COVID-19 Closure FAQ & Resources

• In a surprise announcement, Governor Whitmer relaxed many of the business restrictions that had been in place since the start of the pandemic in Michigan. The staff of the Library appreciate your patience during this difficult time and we look forward to resuming service. The majority of staff have not been allowed in the library since mid-March. We will take some time to prepare our staff to resume providing services and clear the backlogged work. Staff training for distancing in the work environment, cleaning, new workflow patterns and handling materials is required by State Executive Order.

Beginning **Monday, June 8 our parking lot drop boxes will be unlocked** to accept returned materials. Returned materials will be quarantined for a period of three days. No fines will be assessed while we continue to quarantine materials.

Our curbside service will resume Monday, June 15. For the week of June 15, the Library will provide curbside service between 12:00 pm and 6:00 pm, Monday through Friday. We will close on Saturday and Sunday, June 20-21 and assess how the week went. Adjustments to service hours will follow.

As with everything related to the pandemic, dates may be subject to change based on State-level directives. We will continue to monitor public health conditions and make adjustments, including reopening the building for access, as conditions improve. Our Pandemic Response Plan can be found on our web site at <https://dexter.lib.mi.us/about/library-policies/>. We have missed seeing all our patrons and hope you have remained healthy and well during this time. We look forward to serving you soon.

• Just ahead of the Memorial Day weekend, Governor Whitmer issued a new Executive Order (EO 2020-96) which extended statewide 'Stay Home, Stay Safe' orders through June 12. In issuing this order ahead of the Memorial Day weekend, the Governor did relax some restrictions on areas in northern Michigan and for certain types of businesses. However, the order continues prohibitions on providing all but critical, government in-person services (Section VII.) This even applies to areas of the State which have seen relaxation of commerce. Unfortunately, the order precludes the Library for providing any direct, in-person services. According to the State's MI Safe Start Plan, Michigan has been divided into eight regions, which will be monitored for COVID-19 progression. Washtenaw County falls into Region 1, along with the counties of Genesee, Lapeer, Livingston, Oakland, Macomb, Monroe, Saint Clair and Wayne counties. Due to the prevalence of COVID-19 cases in Wayne County, it is expected that our region will see restrictions on movement and service continue to be tighter than other regions of the State. The Library continues to prepare a reopening plan to ensure that when restrictions are lifted, we will be able to resume lending materials in a manner that is safe for both our staff and the general public.

• On May 7, 2020, Governor Whitmer extended the statewide "Stay Home" order by issuing Executive Order 2020-77. This order continues closure of public libraries through May 28 and provides more consistency with previous Executive Orders (see below.) With the current order, the Library is not allowed to bring staff back into the Library to prepare to restore services. As we move forward through this crisis, we continue to monitor our options. The Library's drop boxes remain closed and we still cannot accept donations of materials. We continue to work with the staff at our library cooperative (The Library Network) to adjust due dates for items previously borrowed as well as extend borrower card expiration dates. Rest assured, no fines will accrue for the duration of this crisis. The Library will follow the State's MI Safe Start Plan and restore some form of in-person services when possible. We continue to expand our digital services and have increased borrowing limits for our hoopla and Kanopy services. If you do not have a Dexter District Library borrower's card, our online application process is quick, easy and can get you started borrowing materials while sheltering. On behalf of the staff and Board, we hope you and your family remain healthy and well.

• On April 24, Governor Whitmer extended the 'Stay Home' order with Executive Order 2020-59, which allowed some restoration of business activities. While there was a curbside service caveat for some businesses, the order was reviewed by the Library's attorney along with the Library of Michigan legal staff. Their interpretation of the order was that Section 6, outlining limitations on governmental activities, precluded resumption of any in-person service by public libraries to the general public. This requires our current posture of being closed to the public and relying on digital services to continue through May 15. We continue to prepare for the time when we can resume services. While we do not know for certain what form that will take, the Library is developing several scenarios to adapt to environmental conditions and provide a safe experience for the public as well as safe working conditions for our staff. Please continue to monitor our website for new information as it becomes available.

• If you returned any Library items between Friday, 3/13/2020 and early Wednesday AM, 3/18/2020 - those items have been placed in a quarantine and will continue to show on your account until they've been checked back in.

These same items may be showing as overdue, lost or as fines on your account. You will not be fined for any items returned during this period. All of the fines will be erased when the items get checked in.

• Our outdoor return boxes are now locked. Please keep all materials at home for the time being. No overdue fines will be assessed during this period.

• All library cards that had recently expired or were going to expire soon have had expiration dates extended.

• Don't have a library card? Click here to apply for one.

Online registration is only available to residents of the Dexter School District. If you reside outside our service area, please check with your home library about getting a card.

• The Wi-Fi signal at the Library is available 24/7. Most devices get a strong signal in our parking lot and (when the weather is nice) for the benches along Alpine Street as well as the terrace area in Mill Creek Park North.

Although many businesses were still being shuttered for safety during May, Real Estate was given the green light, and Realtors were chomping at the bit to get back out selling. The use of video tours on listings were used minimally prior to the stay at home order, but have become common place now as a way for interested buyers to understand floor plans and get a better sense of the feel of homes. Homes were selling in May without buyers actually walking through the house, but by watching the virtual tours. The numbers here aren't as bad as one may expect considering what we've been through in the past several months, and check out the num-

ber of new listings compared to last year!

Of the 64 new listings last month, 38 have accepted offers or have sold! Currently there are 96 homes in Dexter available on the market. Things are happening now that are consistent with previous years spring market frenzy; multiple offers, price escalation clauses attempting to out-bid other offers, quick sales and cash offers. Buyers must be ready to write offers

and be pre-approved for their mortgages, and houses for sale need to be show ready and priced right. What has changed is safety measures that are currently in place; agents and buyers must wear masks, and are encouraged to touch as few things as possible. Open houses are starting back up. We're now practicing our new normal. Sales remain strong, as do the sales prices.

I'm just a travelin' man...

One of my favorite pastimes in life is driving throughout the state of Michigan, from Monroe to Menominee and from Cassopolis to Calumet and all points in between.

Last spring and summer and into fall before it became too cold and snowy, I traveled throughout the western Upper Peninsula. Three of my loves in life are history, sports and all things state of Michigan. In each area or city or town throughout the Great Lakes State that I drive through and visit, I always look for each location's history, sports history and interesting "state of Michigan" tidbits, trivia, legends or myths, etc. that make the place I'm exploring unique.

With the warmer weather and pleasant temperatures, I decided to hop in my vehicle,

crank up the Van Halen and AC/DC tunes and hit the road seeking adventure. I decided to stay close to home to start my "travelin' season," visiting Jackson, Michigan. A 20-minute or so drive west on I-94, I've been to Jackson many times, but always just for a quick bite to eat or simply driving through toward another location.

Founded in 1829, the city of Jackson is named after Andrew Jackson, the nation's seventh president and the hero of the Battle of New Orleans in the War of 1812. With a population of close to 35,000, Jackson is the county seat of Jackson County and is the cultural and entertainment hub of the area.

Jackson is known for being the "birthplace of the Republican Party" at a site in town known as "Under the Oaks." Politicians met at the site in the 1850s to discuss important issues of the day. The town also is known for the beautiful and jaw-dropping Cascade Falls, the Ella Sharp Park and the Ella Sharp Museum, the opulent and grand Michigan Theater and the mysterious, seven-story, stone-walled Helmer Castle.

Jackson also claims to be the "birthplace of the Coney Island hot dog." In 1914, George Todoroff opened the first Coney Island restaurant right next to the Michigan Central Railroad Jackson De-

pot. On the U.S. Register of Historic Places, the Jackson Depot was opened in 1841 and is reported to be the oldest train station in con-

tinuous active use in the nation.


Jackson is also home to Michigan's first state prison. Built in 1838, the Jackson State Prison was massive and by 1882, it was the world's largest walled prison. The original prison closed in 1934.

Jackson is also home to Pro Football Hall-of-Famer Tony Dungy. A 1972 graduate of Jackson Parkside High School, Dungy would go on to play at the University of Minnesota before prowling the defensive secondary in the NFL for the Pittsburgh Steelers, San Francisco 49ers and the New York Giants.



Jackson native Jack Paar was the second host of "The Tonight Show."

In 1978, he helped lead the Steelers to victory in Super Bowl XIII. After his playing career ended, Dungy was head **continued on page 9**



Jackson's Al Worden was a part of the three-man crew of NASA's Apollo 15 trip to the moon in 1970. Soon after returning from space, Worden presented his alma mater Jackson High School, with a Block J from the school's flag he took to the moon and back.

One number, 734-544-3050, should be added to address books all across the county. It's the CARES access number for mental health and substance use treatment services offered by Washtenaw County Community Mental Health.

The number may be needed at 3:00 a.m. on a Monday, during kickoff on Homecoming weekend, or 6:00 p.m. on a Sunday. In fact, twenty-four hours a day, seven days a week, 365 days a year--the phones at Washtenaw County Community Mental Health are staffed and CARES social workers, therapists, peer-specialists, and psychiatrists are on standby to offer Crisis response services, Access to mental health services, Resource connections, Engagement with community partners, and Support for individual needs.

Middle and high school teachers should have kids take out their phones and program it in during math class. Anyone who's lost a loved one, struggled with addiction, or experienced mental health challenges and had difficulty finding help should post it on the fridge right now.

These staff aren't exclusively for residents with severe needs or critical emergencies; they're for everyone, in every one of the county's townships. That wasn't always the case.

Washtenaw County Community Mental Health, like community mental health agencies all across the state, has been contending with major state funding reductions that don't even come close to covering the cost of mandated services.

Jackson County passed a similar millage in the spring of 2017 and opened a Crisis R&R facility just 15 months later. The living room-style facility is open five days a week for anyone in crisis and staff are there to welcome guests on arrival and connect them to a broad range of resources including counseling, housing, food, and more"

For several years, those cuts led to diminished services, but, thanks to the eight-year Public Safety and Mental Health Millage which was passed by Washtenaw County voters last fall by a two to one margin, Washtenaw County Community Mental Health administrators began to extend services to more residents, all across the county.

As we write this, only eight months since Washtenaw County millage dollars first became available, the list of services is long and growing. And, the list of success stories is following suit.

Residents have been referred to community psychologists for short-term counseling to contend with a loss. They've been able to access enough prescribed medicines to cover until they could get to see their doctors. They've gotten same-day appointments with behavioral health specialists and primary care providers; help filling out insurance, housing, and food applications; advice from peers with lived experience; and rides to necessary appointments. In sum, we provide dozens of different support services at little or no cost to clients.

"Millage-funded staff expansions have allowed Washtenaw County Community Mental Health to respond to 800 more crisis service requests in the first six months of 2019--from January to June--than the agency did during the same time frame last year, and we've received 250 referrals in a two month period for other services," says Program Administrator Melisa Tasker. "It's been such an honor to speak with and serve residents all across the county and we're looking forward to announcing many more program and system improvements in the years ahead."

Where do Washtenaw County residents go to get these services? To Ypsilanti and Ann Arbor, of course, but also to rural sites across the county.

Through agreements with local organizations Washtenaw County Community Mental Health administrators are placing staff at external facilities with no cost to taxpayers. Residents are now getting free and low-cost assistance for mental health and substance use needs in Chelsea and Dexter. Soon, residents will be able to meet with community mental health staff in Manchester and Whitmore Lake as well.

According to Chelsea Police Chief Ed Toth, "Thirty years ago, you might deal with a mental health crisis a few times a year. Now it's a weekly situation. We're a small agency here, usually a couple of people covering a shift and that's all. But every time I've called the CARES hotline, the response team has been super for us."

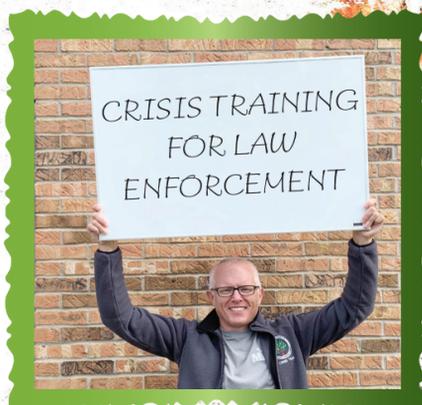

The Broad Use of the Term “Exercise”

Homebound students are being told to ‘exercise their brains’.

Seniors, for decades, have been told their heart is a muscle and it needs exercise.

We are supposed to exercise our rights.

If someone just says exercise, most of us think about the kind of exercise happening on trails and sidewalks all over our 5 Healthy Towns. Physical movement.

And now, the people in our 5 Healthy Towns have done an amazing job of exercising their civic muscle.

In 2010, 2015 and again in 2020 residents in our communities were asked to participate in surveys. The purpose of the surveys is to guide decisions about how to make our community healthier in mind and body.

In 2010 and 2015 the surveys were done

by phone. Everyone involved worried that, because of challenges presented by cell phones, we wouldn’t be able to reach enough people to meet our goals. We were right to worry. We didn’t meet our goals for the number of respondents in any of the five communities in 2015.

In 2020 5 Healthy Towns Foundation decided to try a different approach. We hired a local company, Second

to None, and asked them to conduct an electronic survey. We designed questions to tell us only what we need to know, reducing the total number of questions from 200 to 20 – saving survey-takers valuable time.

Once the survey was designed, we asked everyone we know to push out the link to the survey. We had an amazing response! Amazing!

In Chelsea we had a 165% percent improvement in responses from 2015 to 2020.

In Dexter the percent improvement was also 165.

Grass Lake had a 144% improvement over 2015.

Manchester’s improvement was 134%.

And Stockbridge stole the percentage of improvement show with a whopping 193% improvement in re-

sponses between 2015 and 2020.

In order of total number of responses, Chelsea finished in first place. Manchester finished in second place with Dexter close behind. Grass Lake and Stockbridge followed, in that order. Special mention to Manchester. They are our smallest community and finished with the second highest number of responses by the day the survey was scheduled to end.

For now, the total number of surveys completed is the most significant thing we know. Soon we’ll start telling you other important things we will learn about the way we live. I suspect there will be some surprises – let’s hope they are all good.

We promised one randomly drawn winner in each community. We asked the peo-

ple at Second to None to select the winners, electronically, so there would be no influence by those of us who know the communities, well. Winners will each select a gift worth \$200, with a wellness focus. Those winners are:

Andrea Tompkins – Grass Lake

Sue Phare - Manchester

Wesley Starr – Stockbridge

The Dexter and Chelsea winners have asked to remain anonymous.

Congratulations to these winners and to everyone in the community who will benefit from our ability to focus future spending on areas of greatest need.

We truly thank all the ~2600 people who exercised their civic muscle.

Interview with Arianne Slay: Candidate for Washtenaw County Prosecutor

► continued from page 1 in the county. Arianne believes the best way to reduce criminal behavior is to address the root cause of crime. The first time the courts see a criminal can have a huge impact on the future, not just for the criminal, but for all of us, who can potentially become victims if the root cause is not addressed. She listed common issues that need addressing to prevent criminal behavior; healthcare, affordable housing, and mental health. Arianne stated she needs community involvement to provide real solutions. She also said Washtenaw County is missing data and the ability to collect data and review trends and results. She explained that only focusing on punitive actions can create worse situations that equate to future

crime. She explained that job loss, housing loss, court costs, and fines can lead a person to commit more crime. She’d like to focus on rehabilitative options. She mentioned her experience with the mental health court. She reiterated that community involvement and participation are needed to co-produce reform, including bringing in social service providers. She is also well versed in victims’ experience. She currently trains law enforcement and prosecutors across the state of Michigan on domestic violence investigation and prosecution. Arianne acknowledges that in some cases, criminals need to be removed from society. She’s prosecuted every type of crime from drunk driving to homicide. Her experience and understand-

ing of what the office needs is impressive. To read more about her work, I encourage you to visit her website at arianne-slay.com.

I asked Arianne Slay how her campaign had changed with COVID-19. She stated that instead of door knocking, she is phone banking. I asked her how it was going. She sounded surprised that people were genuinely happy to hear from the candidates. She thought maybe social isolation made people more receptive to phone calls. Arianne enjoys helping voters become more informed so she’s enjoying being able to get in contact with residents. She stated that with restrictions easing that her campaign will be doing no contact door hanging. Her first mailer is going out and yard signs are be-

ing distributed across the county.

Arianne Slay has a long list of endorsements including; Kym Worthy Wayne County Prosecutor, Jerry Clayton Washtenaw County Sheriff, Saline Mayor Brian Marl, Chelsea Mayor Melissa Johnson, Sue Shink Washtenaw County Commissioner and many, many more. For a complete list check out her website mentioned above.

Arianne Slay’s website states if elected she would be Washtenaw County’s first female and first African American county prosecutor. It also states that her father was a police officer. Could not ignore the current state of affairs in this country. She explained that her father became a police officer because of a horrible experience as a child, an experience that should have involved the police, but did not because the police were members of the KKK. He taught her that he wanted to be a part of the change from within. Arianne is carrying on the family tradition.

“I understand the culture of policing in our country is not what we deserve. The culture in some places it’s more acceptable to not have evolved. I want to be the chief law enforcement of the county.” She went on to address training of officers. She stated the only requirement for training after being hired is gun certifica-

tion. Arianne Slay is a certified Mcoles instructor. She explained that a police officer needs to have the heart of a social worker and the patience of a kindergarten teacher. She said as an instructor she’s trying to change the culture. She said experience actually matters and our community deserves trauma-informed police able to ask questions in a respectful way. As a prosecutor of domestic violence, she’s learned how to treat victims in the best possible way. Arianne also addressed the need for bias training and de-escalation

training. Arianne states that like her father, she believes reform must come from the inside. She states that she has the experience to navigate the system. She won’t blow up the system and will follow legislation. But she believes some legislation needs to change for lasting systemic change. She believes everyone has a place in change. She appreciates the protests. Arianne states somebody has to go in and get things to change. “Somebody has to do it. I’m ready.” Based on her vast experience, I believe her.

Superintendent Timmis hosts Information Session On Online Learning

On June 2, Chris Timmis provided a virtual meeting to discuss the work the district is doing to provide online learning for students. The rate of change regarding COVID-19 has been rapid. Each time an order changes, the school scrambles to adjust. It sounds like Dr. Timmis would like to be prepared for everything. The Dexter School District is working overtime to be ready.

Online learning will be improved from this past Spring. Parents struggled with the use of multiple platforms. The district is attempting to streamline so that platforms are the same and based on

grade level. If parents have multiple students across the grades, there could potentially be several platforms in use. The platforms used will be based on grade and the decision to go online only, or hybrid. And yes, because that was a common question, Dexter is planning on providing parents with a hybrid option.

Many final decisions on which platforms and online sources will depend on the number of students and size of online courses. The school will be working through the data and checking back with parents as the summer continues. Parents are not required to make final decisions right now.

It will be helpful to have decisions in early August, but as the situation is fluid, the decision will be fluid until the start of school.

Students choosing online, will receive grades, have access to counseling services, and special education services. Online students will be allowed to participate in sports and clubs as well. The online option that Dexter is likely to use for elementary aged children is Lincoln Interactive. K-2 will use seesaw, 3-12 will use canvas. The summit program has its own platform. Classes will be planned so that students can go online or attend in person. When school starts the goal is to

have a month of lessons ready. This will allow parents to utilize the hybrid option. If someone in the school contracts COVID-19 and a mandatory shutdown happens for a few days, students can continue to work on schedule at home.

For students in grades 9-12, Dexter already uses Michigan Virtual Classroom for online students at the high school level. Prior to COVID-19, Dexter had upwards of 250 students taking some online courses every year through Virtual Classroom. If there are not enough students for a course, students will utilize Michigan Virtual Classroom. If there are enough students, Dexter teachers will


create a hybrid course for students.

Dr. Timmis discussed a timeline. He explained he is waiting for state guidelines. He expects he will get them by the end of June. He reminded us of how quickly everything changes. Once there are state guidelines, the school will release plans. Dexter School District is working very hard to create pathways for all students in the district. It seems like a challenging job, given how rapidly things have changed.

The district has been following schools across the world to see what options are working. A model that seems to be working is to have things set up so stu-

dents can do a mix of in class and remote learning, with the goal of moving toward and phasing in to school full time. Nobody is certain where things will be in September. Regardless, the parents will be offered a full online option through the district no matter what.

The situation is changing daily. I'm confident the district is working hard each and every day to make certain all students and parents have options with which they are comfortable. It's not a job I envy, but I am impressed with the care and effort by administration and staff to ensure each student has access to education during a pandemic.



It is with a heavy heart that we announce that the 49th annual Dexter Daze Festival has been cancelled. We appreciate our Patrons, Vendors and especially our Community for the support that you've shown us during this time. We appreciate those who have helped us look for a solution, by talking and working through ideas and questions, by being part of the plan and by being proactive in finding resolution. Dexter Daze is more than a summer party. It has an economic impact on many organized Groups, Vendors, Contractors, Entertainers and even our local Community here in Dexter. coach of the Tampa Bay Buccaneers (1996 through 2001) and the Indianapolis Colts (2002 through 2008). In 2007, Dungy became the first African-American head coach to win the Super Bowl as the Colts defeated the Chicago Bears, 29-17 in Super Bowl XLI.
Jackson native Jack Paar, whose boyhood home still stands in town, was the second host of the iconic television program,

"The Tonight Show." He hosted from 1957 through 1962. He succeeded the show's original host Steve Allen (1954 through 1957) and preceded arguably the show's most famous host, Johnny Carson (1962 through 1992).
Something unique about Jackson is one of the most famous ragtime songs in music history, "Won't You Come Home Bill Bailey" was written by Hughie Cannon, a piano player at Conrad

Deidrich's Saloon in Jackson. Cannon met a man named Bill Bailey while performing at the saloon and during conversations with Bailey learned about the difficulties he was having with his wife. Those talks with Bailey at the saloon in Jackson inspired Cannon to write his now famous song. Popular in the early 1900s, Cannon's song shot to No. 1 in the country and has been covered since by some of music's most legend-

ary performers including Sam Cooke, Sarah Vaughn, Patsy Cline, Ella Fitzgerald, Louis Armstrong and Della Reese. It has been parodied in such cartoons as "The Simpsons," "The Flintstones" and "The Jetsons."
Finally, Jackson is the boyhood home of NASA astronaut Al Worden. A 1950 graduate of Jackson High School, Worden is one of only 24 astronauts in U.S. space history to travel to the moon.

Worden was a member of the three-man crew of Apollo 15 in 1970. Though not walking on the moon, Worden spent three days alone in the Apollo 15 command module circling the moon. He's listed in the Guinness Book of World Records for being the "most isolated human" in history during his orbiting of the moon. Worden also was the first astronaut in history to perform a deep-space spacewalk. An interesting side

note, is Worden took a Block J from the Jackson High School flag to the moon, stuffing it in his pocket throughout the mission. When he returned to Jackson in 1971 for a ceremony honoring his achievements, he presented the school with the Block J. Today, almost 50 years later, that Block J which went to the moon and back, continues to hang prominently on a wall in Jackson High School. I'm just a travelin' man...
