LOCAL MAN MARKS 30 YEARS IN LAND CONSERVATION



the conservancy, Barry also led the charge to promote public funding for the purchase of natural areas as preserves and conservation easements on farmland. In the succeeding years, proposals to establish dedicated funding have been passed with overwhelming support by voters in Washtenaw County, the City of Ann Arbor and three townships (Ann Arbor, Scio and Webster) a total of ten times. To date over \$200 million of public funds have been committed to protect open space and agricultural land in the county.

Barry currently operates his consulting firm Treemore Ecology and Land Services, and staffs the three funded township programs. He is responsible for the protection of 110 properties totalling over 7,700 acres over the last three decades.

In June, 1991, Barry Lonik was elected to the board of trustees for a nascent land conservancy in Washtenaw County called Potawatomi Community Land Trust. He had found his calling. A year later Barry was elected board president and soon began

fundraising to create a part-time position for himself. That later became a full-time position and he led the organization—now called Legacy Land Conservancy—for ten years, establishing it as a respected, sustaining nonprofit organization based in Ann Arbor.

Of all that Barry is most proud of protecting the 478 acre centennial farm of Howard and Kelven Braun on the border of the City of Saline, the 286 acre centennial farm of Charles and Catherine Braun farm in Ann Arbor Township and the sesquicentennial 160 acre

Aprill farm in Scio Township as well as helping to establish a half dozen farms that are producing fresh fruit, vegetables and meat on the edge of Ann Arbor.

Barry lives on a two acre property west of Dexter dubbed "Rancho Tranquillico" where he grows

most of his fruits and vegetables and has installed a prairie on half of it. He also hosts musical events in his 130 year old barn in the Summer (30 this year!) and loves to hike, swim, sail, ski, run and bike the woods, waters and backroads near his home.

YOUR REAL ESTATE QUESTIONS



Oh No, Your Appraisal Came in Low!

Dear Tracy,
When my home went on the market as a For Sale By Owner, we received multiple offers. It was exciting to see so many good offers and we ultimately accepted an offer at \$23,000 over the asking price! The appraisal just came in low, at \$10,000 under the agreed upon sale price. Do we have to lower the sale price to the appraised value?
Missy R.

Dear Missy,
Your situation is not uncommon at this time with available housing at a critically low stage. Currently, when a home hits the market and is priced right, requests for showings begin immediately and multiple offers are quickly presented. Usually the offers are at and above the listed price. When buyers make offers signifi-

cantly above the asking price, there is a risk that the appraisal will come in low, below the agreed upon sale price on the contract.

When you accepted the offer above the asking price, did the sales contract contain a clause that addressed a potential appraisal shortfall? If so, the clause should have clarified that the buyer will cover some or all of a potential

appraisal shortfall.

If your sales contract does not contain this clause, depending on the language and contingencies in your sales contract, you may have these choices:

1) The buyers may elect to proceed with the sale as written and will purchase the property, which will require them to cover the appraisal shortfall.

2) The buyers

may request that you lower the price to the appraised value. You may decline to do so and put your home back on the market.

3) You and the buyer may re-negotiate and agree to meet somewhere in between the appraised value and the sale price.

In this hot market, it is important to have the language in your sale contract, upon execution, that

covers an appraisal shortfall. A good local realtor will be able to help you navigate through this complicated market to ensure your bottom-line is protected for a variety of complex deal points. Although selling by owner may seem like a good idea, if your contract is missing critical clauses, such as an appraisal guarantee, selling by owner may erode your bottom-line.

Sondheim director and Encore Artistic Director Dan Cooney. "He really is one of a kind. No other composer has produced the breadth of work that Sondheim has. Maybe we'll see that with Lin-Manuel Miranda (Hamilton), but that remains to be seen."

Stephen Sondheim grew up under the guidance of Golden Age composer Oscar Hammerstein, who served as a surrogate father after Sondheim's own father abandoned the family. Cooney adds that, through Hammerstein, Sondheim "learned the rules of the form; through his own genius, he played with those rules, bent them, and created something new for composers to emulate." The lyrical

complexity of Hamilton is already familiar to anyone who has ever heard Sondheim's "patter songs" like "Getting Married Today" (Company) or "A Little Priest" (Sweeney Todd), both of which are featured in The Encore production.

"Simply Sondheim" features Broadway actress Jessica Grové (Thoroughly Modern Mille, Les Misérables) along with Encore mainstays David Moan, Sarah Stevens, and Chris Joseph.

On Broadway, Grové sung Sondheim in "Sunday In The Park With George" and "A Little Night Music," a show known for its much-performed "Send In The Clowns." Grové, who also appeared in a benefit reading of the never-before-stage Eve-

ning Primrose also believes Sondheim "re-invented the American musical."

"Steve writes for the actor," she adds. "It's fully formed and complex. If you can master Sondheim, you can perform musical theatre."

As The Encore resumes productions, Cooney adds, "We are doing these concerts to highlight the complexity and beauty found his catalog like 'Finishing The Hat,' 'Being Alive,' 'Anyone Can Whistle,' and the absolutely stunning 'Sunday.'"

This morning I drove to the first in person forum meeting in what felt like forever. There were Zooms every other Saturday, but over Zoom, something is lost in translation. The friendly comradery and the dad jokes weren't as readily available over Zoom. Saturday, the forum met at a new venue, with more space and more air circulation. It felt more like a brainstorming session

than a way for neighbors to share what is happening within the community, as it is normally. Diverse opinions, respectful of their neighbors and friends, a little gem in this political environment.

The meeting opened with a heartfelt thank you to all the first responders who sustained us through this nightmare, police, fire, emt, drs, nurses, grocery store employees, and postal service workers. The room seemed to collectively nod our heads in disbelief of what we'd survived. Someone noted that just over a year ago, if a person claimed 600,000 of us would die and we'd be celebrating Juneteenth as a National Holiday, we would laugh at the absurdity. But there

we sat on Juneteenth, alive and grateful. I could not help but smile.

The township trash issue was on the agenda. The issue seems to be stemming from a driver shortage. But, we also discussed recycling when a county commissioner offered that he had proof his recycling was going into the dump like his other trash. There is a soft market for recyclables and the bottom line is always going to be the bottom line. While the forum didn't have the quick easy solution, it was noted that Dexter does now have a zero waste store. Bee Joyful is a place the consumer can shop to create less waste. Western Washtenaw Recycling Authority does have markets for the recyclables they collect. It was noted that the consumers can also attempt to purchase materials made with recycled products. No immediate solutions but small steps we can all take to improve the situation, long term. Brainstorming and open conversations about an issue, with a variety of input and opinions feels productive and useful even without quick easy solutions.

We learned that Miller Rd. is open again, but the signs will remain in place until the company contracted to place them gets

contracted to place them somewhere else; it's more economical than removing and storing them.

There are two open seats on the Dexter Board of Education. Board President Julie Schumaker has resigned her position so she and her husband can move. Daryl Kipke, Board Secretary, has also resigned. The City Council is trying to fill it's vacant position as well.

The discussion on the labor shortage resumed. No exact cause was determined, but the question of laziness and lack of motivation was raised. A dad joke made us laugh. There is a help wanted sign for, "heavy truck drivers," which seems to be permanent. The question was raised, how heavy does one need to be? Others pointed out that if a person worked a summer job and didn't drink or gamble away their earnings, that money could support two semesters at a University. As a class of 2000 graduate of the University of Michigan, that idea is unimaginable to me. A summer job would pay for books and clothing for a school year but not much beyond that. I just finished paying off my student loans after years of working to do it. I also worked the entire time I attended school, to cover housing and food. It

is a different world and now, after Covid, we are entering a whole new one. I guess we'll just sit back and watch as it unfolds. I'm certainly grateful to have the wisdom and diversity of opinions of the Dexter Forum to observe with.

So, we know the answer to "why here," but why now?




