

## Washtenaw County Working to be First County in Michigan with 100% Broadband Coverage

Being trapped in the middle of a pandemic, provided us all with lessons we never considered. Five months prior to Covid-19 hitting Michigan, I suffered a stroke. Part of my recovery was relearning to swallow, type, and speak without a slur. Any large scary medical emergency, or chronic illness is followed by numerous visits to doctors to ensure health. Due to the location of my

stroke, I lost my driver's license until I could be professionally tested to be certain I was safe to be on the road. So, I was unable to legally drive and I was required to be in Ann Arbor sometimes three days a week for appointments. My husband was working a full time job to support our family and he was unavailable to take me. While my age made me an unusual case, this is a common issue for older Americans. Thankfully, my par-

ents are close enough that they could help. We learned, through Covid, that many of these appointments could have been done over Zoom. Many, especially the speech, swallowing and brain function appointments did not require a physical assessment of my well being. Covid taught us that being able to access the internet from home is important for every school child and for older and chronically ill Americans. It is also integral for the

business world. We may have never understood just how important the internet is without having to rely on it so much this past year.

Thankfully, Washtenaw County is working hard to ensure every household in the county has access to the internet. The county could make history in Michigan, by being the first county with 100% coverage. I had the privilege of attending a broadband task force meeting, over

Dexter logos and the window stickers for cars. Neil explained that he got his start working in Chelsea, with college licensed products. He helped with college bookstores, so when he started in 2016, he knew the products he wanted and the companies he'd use. But, in his former shop by the post office, he did not have room for all his products. Now, in the space which opened in May, he does. Aside from t-shirts and sweatshirts, he'll have hats, stickers for cars, pencils, banners, tumblers, yard signs and

anything a proud parent or grandparent could want. The items are customizable. So, if you find a shirt you can add a name or team to the back. Neil went on to explain that the storefront just features Dexter themed products, but that's not the extent of his business. Neil also supplies local businesses with work shirts. # Summer Warm Ups!

This past week, the weather has really felt like summer is here! This year it is an exceptionally sweet summer as we are able to do more activities safely. If you are like me, you have plans to involve your dog in as many of these activities as you can. I have plans to take Dan swimming and kayaking, and to visit some patios with Doug. We'll be walking more, traveling together to visit family, and all sorts of other fun things.

But, before you include your dog in new activities (or ones that your dog might be rusty with due to our quieter lifestyle last summer), I'd encourage you to do some warm ups. While your dog can learn to love your summer activities, it can be overwhelming to jump in too fast.

There are two parts to pre-summer activity warm ups, and doing both is a great idea.

One part of your warm up routine should include brushing up on your dog's training. If you haven't practiced leash walking or come or stay since your pup-

py class - get out your clicker and treats. Be sure to pay generously for your dog's efforts. This practice will refresh your dog's skills, help to reinforce focus on you, and remind your dog that she can earn really super good treats for these behaviors.

The second half of your summer warm up routine should include gradually reintroducing your dog to the environments where the activities occur. If you can't visit the exact environment ahead of time, going somewhere similar will still be helpful. You might go to a quieter park when working up to going to a busy one or perhaps you could try Downtown Chelsea on a weeknight before going to Sights and Sounds.

With Dan, our first kayak trip won't be on the Huron river on a Saturday. Instead, I'll introduce him to the kayak at home, on the ground. Then we will head out to a small, quiet lake on a weekday when it won't be too busy. This way, he can learn about the kayak without lots of exciting distractions. Throughout the summer we can do bus-

ier and busier kayak outings and maybe in August he'll be ready for the excitement of the Huron river on a hot summer day.

Likewise, for Doug, we'll brush up on settling on a mat at home on our deck. Then we'll try a patio at lunch or on a weekday afternoon. # OneBigConnection.org Launches during National Mental Health Month

To foster and build community connections, optimism, resilience, and engagement, 5 Healthy Towns Foundation (5HF) and its partners are pleased to launch OneBigConnection.org (OBC) during National Mental Health Awareness Month, this May. OneBigConnection.org is a new virtual platform tool that anyone in our service area can use.

One Big Connection will go live with a soft launch on May 26th. New information and features will be made available in the coming weeks and months as we receive user and partner feedback.

The purpose of OneBigConnection.org, is to create an online community where residents can share information and quickly find local resources. It is also a place to come together in Action Teams that address important issues for our community members, like isolation and youth mental health.

“This site, funded with Wellness Coalition money, belongs to the community,” says 5HF CEO Amy Heydlauff. “The rich resources you will find at OneBigConnection.org highlight the good people in our five towns, caring for each other. We hope that OBC will be a positive step to help individuals make healthy connections, find interesting and vital resources they trust, and reduce the discomfort surrounding mental health conversations.”

This free platform is a project sponsored by One Big Thing, a collaborative initiative launched in 2019 with Michigan Medicine/Family Medicine, St. Joseph Mercy Chelsea, Washtenaw County Community Mental Health, and the 5HF Community Wellness Coalitions, to promote positive

mental health practices and decrease mental health crisis situations in our communities. According to Lori Kintz, 5HF’s Coalition Coordinator and OneBigConnection editor, “The platform is a work in progress. Every week new information and resources will be added until the site is so robust it becomes a regular part of our online routine.”

We are planning a free 30-minute demo of the site in June. Watch for updates on our FaceBook page.

The site includes:

- **Action Teams** that are places to come together, post information and solve local challenges.

- **Facts and Figures** will house current local and regional statistics and peer-reviewed articles to keep us informed. The information can also be used by area

non-profits in grant applications or strategic planning.

- **A Resource Directory** will allow local non-profit service providers to post their information on a variety of topics addressing vital conditions like mental health and outreach services, reliable transportation, health and safety services, and social supports. If you are a local provider or organization who wishes to be added to our directory, go to <https://www.onebigconnection.org/submit> for instructions on how to register.

- **Events** will be a place where community organizations can promote upcoming events open to the community.

- **Community Pulse** will feature articles, commentary by local experts, and publications of interest.

• **Polls and Surveys** is an opt-in text messaging service that will provide occasional updates about events and opportunities in the 5HF service area. Participants will receive quick, one-question surveys to monitor our com-



## Washtenaw County Working to be First County in Michigan with 100% Broadband Coverage

► continued from page 1 Zoom, last week.

During the meeting, several pieces of important information were covered. The current step the county is on in making progress toward the goal. RFP #: 8119, OPEN DATE: FRIDAY, JUNE 4, 2021 @ 4:00PM, DESCRIPTION: PUBLIC-PRIVATE PARTNERSHIP FOR FILLING BROADBAND GAPS, ADMINISTRATION. The county will take proposals from providers to provide the needed infrastruc-

ture and service to fill broadband gaps until June 4th at 4:00pm. Proposals will be reviewed and selected by the RFP subcommittee. CTE energy and technology firm will also review. They will get a recommendation to the board of commissioners. The target is to get the recommendation to the board of commissioners July meeting. The award will be made on the basis of criteria outlined in the RFP, which is listed on the Washtenaw County website under the

purchasing tab <https://www.washtenaw.org/659/Purchasing>.

A big question and concern seems to be the cost and how 100% broadband coverage will be paid for. Will this project increase taxes for residents? The money will be from two places. The American Rescue plan awards will partially be utilized for broadband. And the \$600,000 the county received from recreational marijuana tax will be used. But, the full amount will not be used. Some will

go to the sheriff and some will go toward arts, diversity, equity and inclusion. So unless you're using recreational marijuana, you will not be taxed for the project.

The task force is also looking into making certain those without access are able to afford the service. It will take years before everyone has access

to broadband. But, we learned through Covid that access to service is needed but that it needs to be affordable for those with lower incomes. The images of children trying to attend school while sitting in fast food parking lots will not soon be forgotten. The broadband task force is currently reviewing how to

address the issue for people although we are years away from 100% access. To keep updated on the work of the Broadband Task Force and learn more information, go to the website at <https://www.washtenaw.org/2867/Broadband-Task-Force>.

# DREADNAUGHTS EDGE WOODHAVEN BY ONE STROKE TO ADVANCE TO STATE FINALS

As the teams were heading down the back nine toward the clubhouse at Dearborn Country Club on Tuesday afternoon during the Division 1 Golf Regionals, Dexter coach Greg Palkowski paused for a moment to make a prediction.

"It's going to be close, right down to the last hole," said Palkowski. "We are in a real battle with Woodhaven for that third spot."

Palkowski was spot on – in fact, it came down to the last shot on the last hole – as Dexter and Woodhaven contended for third place and another weekend of golf. The Dreadnaughts fired a team score of 325 and beat the Warriors by a single stroke and will join Skyline and Saline

on June 11-12 at Forest Akers West in East Lansing for the D-1 State Finals.

As expected, Skyline led the way in dominating fashion at the D-1 Region 6 tournament. The Eagles, the top-rated team in the state, won their third straight Regional title with a team score of 287, 27 shots better than runner-up Saline.

All five Skyline players shot 76 or below led by two freshman, Vibhav Alokam (70) and Ieuan Jones (71) along with senior Vimal Alokam (71). Junior Luke Richard shot a 75 and sophomore Mitchell Strickland fired a 76 – which would have been the best score on 11 other teams.

Skyline's 287 was a school-record round for 18 holes and was an



amazing 1-under par. All five Eagles finished among the top 10 individual scores.


The prestigious Dearborn Country Club, with its tightly wooded fairways and immaculate greens, offered quite the test on a perfect day for golf. And many of the players brought their 'A' games, especially Jackson High School's Justin Bunch. The senior fired a tournament-best 69 to claim top individual honors. The top three teams – Skyline, Saline and Dex-

ter – advance to the state finals along with the top three individuals not on those teams – Bunch, Woodhaven's Evan Bliss (73) and Bedford's Gaige Keane (74).

The field at the State Finals will include 18 teams and 18 individuals for a total of 108 golfers.

The rest of the scorecard at Dearborn's Regional was Bedford fifth (338), Pioneer sixth (342), Huron seventh (343), Jackson eighth (347), Wyandotte ninth (355), Dearborn 10th (383), Monroe 11th (386), Edsel Ford 12th (410), Lincoln 13th (422), Belleville 14th (466) and John Glenn 15th (477).

Skyline Coach Ash-



ley Mantha was named Regional Coach of the Year. And she used the final results as a teaching lesson – maybe a hint to her team heading to East Lansing.

"Look how close it was with Dexter (325) and Woodhaven (326)," said Mantha. "One stroke! Shows you can never give up as one team stroke decided the difference today for a team moving on to States and another having their season end today. We all have bad shots, but you rally and recover, not snowball your play down into giving up.

"We all toughed

out some less than ideal spots/shots today. I'm proud of those recovery moments."

Dexter was led by senior Jack Kolka, who fired a 75 on the day. Four other Dexter players kept their scorecards below 90 - Dom Sortor (80), Joey Fracassi (81), Niko Michos (89) and Lucas Koone (89).

Every shot counts and Dexter made sure every shot counted.

Following Bliss and his brilliant 73 for Woodhaven were Elijah Saco (76), Dylan Young (77), Luke Crapanzano (100) and Jace Weimer (101).



# COVID-19 Vaccination Clinic Changes

Emergency mass vaccination scaled back as COVID-19 vaccine availability increases

County Health Department and area health care providers are scaling back local mass vaccination clinics. COVID-19 vaccination is now widely available, and there is less need for emergency distribution strategies like mass vaccination sites. COVID-19 vaccination is recommended for anyone 12 years or older. There is no cost to individuals for vaccination.

Washtenaw County Health Department is continuing to provide COVID-19 vaccination through smaller community clinics and walk-ins without an appointment at the Health Department. The Health Department also has a new clinical RV which will be used to bring COVID-19 vaccine to locations across the county.

The Health Department and St. Joseph Mercy Ann Arbor hospital will jointly staff the mass vaccination clinic at Eastern Michigan University Convocation Center on Wednesdays and Saturdays through the end of June. As of May 27, about 72,500 vaccine doses have been given at the EMU site,

and the Health Department overall has given over 91,800 doses.

The mass vaccination clinic at Pierce Lake Elementary in Chelsea, supported by St. Joseph Mercy Chelsea, is closed as of May 25. Anyone that received the first dose in a two-dose series at the Chelsea site can come to the Health Department for their second dose.

"COVID-19 vaccine is now more widely available, and we have less need for large-scale, emergency distribution," says Jimena Loveluck, MSW, health officer with Washtenaw County Health Department. "We and other providers continue to focus on making vaccine as accessible as possible to anyone not yet vaccinated. Vaccination and precautions in public and indoor settings can protect all of us and keep us moving toward more normal activities and gatherings, even though COVID-19 is still circulating as lower levels."

Michigan Medicine has transitioned vaccination from the Michigan Stadium Clinic to the U-M North Campus Research Complex as well as multiple offices and providers.

Michigan Medicine has administered 134,863 doses as of May 26.

For a list of available vaccination options and search tools, see where to get the COVID-19 vaccine.

Anyone under 18 years old needs to be accompanied by a parent or guardian when getting vaccinated. Identification is not required for adolescents, and the parent or guardian at-tests to age.

Anyone getting vaccinated should eat about an hour before vaccination and stay hydrated with water or non-caffeinated beverages.

Transportation Free transportation is available to Washtenaw County vaccination sites. Any resident of any age who needs transportation to get their vaccination can call 844-900-4892 and use the code "Vaccinate Washtenaw" to schedule a ride. Please schedule at least 24 hours in advance, if possible.

**Vaccine Coverage**

In Washtenaw County, 65% of residents 16 years or older have had at least one dose of COVID-19 vaccine, and 59% of those 12-64 years. See local vaccine data and state-wide data.


