## Dexter BOE Bids Farewell to Ron Darr

Dexter Board member Ron Darr attended his last meeting as a board member, June 29th. The board meeting opened with a farewell presentation, which included a video and comments from some of the board members. He was elected in 2002, attended 360 meetings, served on 11 committees, attended 150 committee meetings, and only four board members served longer than his 18 years. He was a very involved band booster. His experience as a senior project manager with the University of Michigan proved invaluable

to the Dexter community. He had a role in construction projects with all district buildings. He served as board secretary for six years and is currently Board Vice President. I'm sure the entire Dexter community thanks him for his service to the schools.

The Superintendent provided his report. He announced that the state guidelines for reopening in the Fall would be out Tuesday. He seemed both happy and apprehensive. Dr. Timmis also stated that graduation will be July 12th and that they are still working on the details.

Nobody spoke during public partici-

pation.

The 20-21 meeting calendar was approved.

A budget amendment for the 19-20 year was approved and had to be done due to the impact of Covid-19. Dick Lundy wanted to make clear that budget amendments are not something the board takes lightly. However, due to extraordinary circumstances, there was no choice.

The proposed budget was approved. But, without all the numbers including the state budget, there are certain to be adjustments in November. The effort was to try to be fiscally responsible while keeping everything



## Interview with Ken Magee: Candidate for Washtenaw County Sheriff

This past week, I had the opportunity to interview Ken Magee, one of two Democrats and candidates, running for Washtenaw County Sheriff. This is another race that will be determined by the August 4 primary. Because of the negative impact COVID-19 has had on campaigns, I'm attempting to get to know each candidate prior to the primary and help the readers learn more about each candidate.

My first question was why? I want to know why everyone decides to run. Ken stated that he has three decades in law enforcement and he sees many things that need to be changed. He wants to restore trust in the police, noting that it's particularly an issue on the Eastside. He wants accountability on all levels and he'd like to improve transparency. Ken specifically discussed difficulty obtaining information under the Freedom of Information Act that he believes should not be as difficult. Once in office, Ken wants to combat the opioid epidemic. He stated, "there have been 200 deaths in Washtenaw County alone since the last election. Ken has a different strategy. All the deaths have been on his opponent's watch. 200 is way too many."

► continued from page 1 She's still alive so I still have hope. But I have no answers. So I was wondering what Ken believes will help the situation. Ken stated, "In order to be an effective law enforcement leader you have to think outside the badge." He was very compassionate after I confessed that my friend is an addict. I appreciated his compassion because most people make assumptions about me because I know someone who is addicted. He did not. He took the time to explain his plan in depth. I really appreciated his compassion. He went on to describe his plan. He uses an acronym to provide the details: PETER.

**Prevention:** Ken mentions the SRSly organization and mentions that a whole lot of people are involved in prevention.

**Enforcement:** not just law enforcement, family values, athletic team values, and expectations. His idea is the enforcement of community standards, by including the entire community.

**Treatment:** Ken thinks we should re-evaluate how we treat addicts. Addicts do commit crimes to obtain drugs and sometimes under the influence. But he believes the best solution is treatment. He believes addiction is a medical illness. He does not believe jail is a good solution. He wants to hold them accountable but in a treatment situation. As a reader, maybe you're wondering how he gets addicts spots in treatment, rather than jail. Ken's idea is to turn

part of the jail into a treatment facility. He sees wasteful spending in inflated salaries for people within the sheriff's office and the jail. He'd like to reduce the waste and use the money to hire social workers and treatment specialists to convert part of the jail into a treatment facility. Ken states that opioids have the most egregious impact on public health and safety. And he will update the community each day on what we are doing to address the issue.

**Recovery:** He states that recovery is not a 30-day process. Employers and families and individuals need to be aware that recovery is life long.

Ken then explained to me that while he was traveling the world as a Federal Narcotics agent his own brother was battling addiction. It was a battle his brother ultimately lost. I immediately understood his compassion and the fact he understands you can care for someone very deeply but be completely separate from their addiction.

Ken then went on to discuss a bit of his history with law enforcement and his experience. He discussed things he had seen throughout his career. Ken was on the DEA team that helped take down Pablo Escobar. He sent me the recognition awarded to him by the Colombian Government. He was in Atlantic City during the Olympics when the bomb went off and helped save a little girl there afterward. He states that with his experience, he knows how to put together a team and a strategy to posi-

tively impact everyone. He feels that as sheriff he can bring all groups together, government, private business, and social agencies to lead the charge against opioids. You can find his plan on YouTube by searching Ken Magee. It's the video listed under Michigan Politics.

He plans on restoring trust in police services by being an active leader present in the moment. I asked Ken what he will do to improve the current situation between public distrust for police officers. Ken stated a more thorough investigation into who is hired to explore bias as well as who is promoted. He also discussed the safety problem for employees with many people having to work double shifts within the jails. He reiterated that the current sheriff has been absent and that he will be present to take charge and be accountable to the community concerns. He will not be delegating this very important work. He will also create a community police oversight panel, and offer the community the opportunity to voice concerns at coffee house sessions. He would like to replace or define how information is obtained under the freedom of information act to provide more transparency from the department. 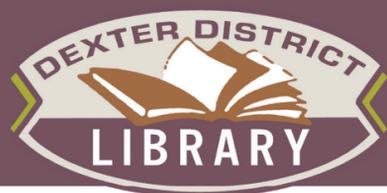

# Dexter District Library 2020 Spring Events for Kids, Tweens and Teens

## COVID-19 Closure FAQ & Resources

• In a surprise announcement, Governor Whitmer relaxed many of the business restrictions that had been in place since the start of the pandemic in Michigan. The staff of the Library appreciate your patience during this difficult time and we look forward to resuming service. The majority of staff have not been allowed in the library since mid-March. We will take some time to prepare our staff to resume providing services and clear the backlogged work. Staff training for distancing in the work environment, cleaning, new workflow patterns and handling materials is required by State Executive Order.

Beginning **Monday, June 8 our parking lot drop boxes will be unlocked** to accept returned materials. Returned materials will be quarantined for a period of three days. No fines will be assessed while we continue to quarantine materials.

**Our curbside service will resume Monday, June 15.** For the week of June 15, the Library will provide curbside service between 12:00 pm and 6:00 pm, Monday through Friday. We will close on Saturday and Sunday, June 20-21 and assess how the week went. Adjustments to service hours will follow.

As with everything related to the pandemic, dates may be subject to change based on State-level directives. We will continue to monitor public health conditions and make adjustments, including reopening the building for access, as conditions improve. Our Pandemic Response Plan can be found on our web site at <https://dexter.lib.mi.us/about/library-policies/>. We have missed seeing all our patrons and hope you have remained healthy and well during this time. We look forward to serving you soon.

• Just ahead of the Memorial Day weekend, Governor Whitmer issued a new Executive Order (EO 2020-96) which extended statewide 'Stay Home, Stay Safe' orders through June 12. In issuing this order ahead of the Memorial Day weekend, the Governor did relax some restrictions on areas in northern Michigan and for certain types of businesses. However, the order continues prohibitions on providing all but critical, government in-person services (Section VII.) This even applies to areas of the State which have seen relaxation of commerce. Unfortunately, the order precludes the Library for providing any direct, in-person services. According to the State's MI Safe Start Plan, Michigan has been divided into eight regions, which will be monitored for COVID-19 progression. Washtenaw County falls into Region 1, along with the counties of Genesee, Lapeer, Livingston, Oakland, Macomb, Monroe, Saint Clair and Wayne counties. Due to the prevalence of COVID-19 cases in Wayne County, it is expected that our region will see restrictions on movement and service continue to be tighter than other regions of the State. The Library continues to prepare a reopening plan to ensure that when restrictions are lifted, we will be able to resume lending materials in a manner that is safe for both our staff and the general public.

• On May 7, 2020, Governor Whitmer extended the statewide "Stay Home" order by issuing Executive Order 2020-77. This order continues closure of public libraries through May 28 and provides more consistency with previous Executive Orders (see below.) With the current order, the Library is not allowed to bring staff back into the Library to prepare to restore services. As we move forward through this crisis, we continue to monitor our options. The Library's drop boxes remain closed and we still cannot accept donations of materials. We continue to work with the staff at our library cooperative (The Library Network) to adjust due dates for items previously borrowed as well as extend borrower card expiration dates. Rest assured, no fines will accrue for the duration of this crisis. The Library will follow the State's MI Safe Start Plan and restore some form of in-person services when possible. We continue to expand our digital services and have increased borrowing limits for our hoopla and Kanopy services. If you do not have a Dexter District Library borrower's card, our online application process is quick, easy and can get you started borrowing materials while sheltering. On behalf of the staff and Board, we hope you and your family remain healthy and well.

• On April 24, Governor Whitmer extended the 'Stay Home' order with Executive Order 2020-59, which allowed some restoration of business activities. While there was a curbside service caveat for some businesses, the order was reviewed by the Library's attorney along with the Library of Michigan legal staff. Their interpretation of the order was that Section 6, outlining limitations on governmental activities, precluded resumption of any in-person service by public libraries to the general public. This requires our current posture of being closed to the public and relying on digital services to continue through May 15. We continue to prepare for the time when we can resume services. While we do not know for certain what form that will take, the Library is developing several scenarios to adapt to environmental conditions and provide a safe experience for the public as well as safe working conditions for our staff. Please continue to monitor our website for new information as it becomes available.

• If you returned any Library items between Friday, 3/13/2020 and early Wednesday AM, 3/18/2020 - those items have been placed in a quarantine and will continue to show on your account until they've been checked back in.

These same items may be showing as overdue, lost or as fines on your account. You will not be fined for any items returned during this period. All of the fines will be erased when the items get checked in.

• Our outdoor return boxes are now locked. Please keep all materials at home for the time being. No overdue fines will be assessed during this period.

• All library cards that had recently expired or were going to expire soon have had expiration dates extended.

• Don't have a library card? Click here to apply for one.

Online registration is only available to residents of the Dexter School District. If you reside outside our service area, please check with your home library about getting a card.

• The Wi-Fi signal at the Library is available 24/7. Most devices get a strong signal in our parking lot and (when the weather is nice) for the benches along Alpine Street as well as the terrace area in Mill Creek Park North.



Or, my favorite.

"Did your mom plan to have her on that day?"

Uh, I don't think so. I've never really asked her. But I'll get right on that, find out and get back

with you, okay?

It was a sad day in the Richter household when my parents had to break the news to my sister the fireworks and celebrations going on every year were not because of her birthday. Amazing she actually thought so, but who am I to judge, right?

I have three older sisters. I'm the youngest and the only boy. My "Fourth of July" sister is the youngest of my three sisters. She's five years older than me. And before you say I was spoiled, let me tell you, I'm lucky to be alive today. My sweet, beautiful and gentle sisters (yeah, right) were more like Kathy Bates' character in the movie "Misery" when mom and dad were away.

I've been chased with a knife, pinned down, pushed down, punched, hair pulled, suffocated with a pillow and flicked in the back of the head more times than I care to remember -- and that

was just on a Monday. Ba dum, dum (cymbal sound)...

While the physical punishment was difficult, the mental torture was the worst.

This would then lead to a wrestling match in the middle of the living room, complete with toppling of lamps and smashing into end tables and couches. My little, early-grade elementary school-sized body was no match for her junior high strength. This back and forth would go on seemingly for hours until mom and dad came home.

Oh, what wonderful memories.

I'm sure I'm embellishing a few of these stories, especially as the years move

on and on. Despite all of the craziness and "stuffed animal abuse" growing up, my sisters and I are thicker than thieves today. In fact, we've always been close. Despite pummeling me growing up, my sisters were always my protectors and my biggest supporters. They came to more than one of my athletic games and cheered loudly for their "little bro."

This weekend, my family and I will get together at my "Fourth of July" sister's lake house. We'll grill burgers and hot dogs, play board games and card games, sing happy birthday, eat cake and ice cream, open presents, take a boat ride and once darkness falls, sit around the bonfire, roast marshmallows and watch the fireworks over the lake.

America's independence.

My sister's birthday.

Our family's "Little Firecracker."

Maybe she'll let me watch TV in peace this time.

running. Currently, it's their best-educated guess.

A new contract was discussed for Superintendent Timmis. The board stated that the contract renewal was based on the district's desire to keep him. He is extremely important to the district and has been recognized nationally. With the current job openings, it appears Dexter felt like they might lose him. The new contract starts July 1st, 2020 and goes through June 30, 2025. Some of the language in the contract was changed. Superintendent Timmis will start earning \$167,000.00 per year. His new contract was unanimously approved.

The district approved a bid from Continental to do painting and cleaning of high bay areas for \$197,000. This cost is down from an expected 1 million-plus. Due to school closings, the maintenance staff was able to get started on the painting that they could reach and did not require special equipment. The mon-

ey cannot come from the bond and will come from general funds.

The board decided and finalized the process to pick the board member replacing Ron Darr. Monday, July 13th, the board will have a special meeting at 5:30pm. The top 3 candidates from the February search in which Jason Gold was selected, will be asked to submit their information and sit through an interview process. The public is welcome to attend. The community chat scheduled will be canceled. There will be several rounds of voting. The top candidate will be sworn in at the meeting. The 2nd place candidate will be an alternate. There will be 3 board seats up for election in November: Barbara Reed, Jason Gold, and this seat.

The draft resolution to adopt anti-racist principals was approved. Several board members expressed the hope that actions will follow the words; that being anti-racist and culturally responsive happens in action and within the district.

Dexter would like to be a leader.

Changes to the by-laws that were previously confusing or had loopholes were discussed. Pending further review they will be adopted.

Three people participated in public comments. Each of the three expressed frustration that the Superintendent was being given a raise during a time of financial uncertainty. Each stated they

were unable to log into the meeting during the first comment section. They were clear that they believe the Superintendent is doing a good job. However, his contract had another year on it. They do not

believe that giving him a raise before needing to update his contract during a pandemic is a fiscally responsible decision.

The meeting concluded with a goodbye to Ron.

It is with a heavy heart that we announce that the 49th annual Dexter Daze Festival has been cancelled. Both the City of Dexter and Scio Township denied our permits for the event and the fireworks, respectively. On top of these denials, the Michigan Department of Labor & Economic Opportunity has generated a proposal for outdoor events/festivals that is being submitted to the governor for approval. The extensive restrictions and requirements that are likely to be enforced make it impossible for us to meet by our August 14-15 event dates.

The proposed requirements are both physical and financial in nature and, as a group of volunteers working with a very limited budget (especially this year), we cannot find a way to meet the constraints being imposed. We hope that these requirements are temporary and that next year we will be able to hold our regular festival.

Please note that there are some events that are going to try and meet the requirements so that they can continue their tradition. We encourage each of you to visit the [michiganfun.com](http://michiganfun.com) website to support those communities who may still be able to hold their events.

We appreciate our Patrons, Vendors and especially our Community for the support that you've shown us during this time. We appreciate those who have helped us look for a solution, by talking and working through ideas and questions, by being part of the plan and by being proactive in finding resolution. Dexter Daze is more than a summer party. It has an economic impact on many organized Groups, Vendors, Contractors, Entertainers and even our local Community here in Dexter. We realize the impact our decision may have on each and every one of them with this announcement and we are truly saddened.



# Dexter Little League Update



As Dexter Little League returns to the field, we are continuing to monitor and implement the guidelines set forth by U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), Little League International and Dexter Community Schools. The guidelines below will help to provide a safe place to play and continue to mitigate the spread of COVID-19.

All Dexter Little League board members, managers, coaches, umpires, league officials, and families are strongly encouraged to review these guidelines.

Dexter Little League will continue to update these guidelines as information is further developed around COVID-19 mitigation.

**Self-monitoring**

- Any player, coach, umpire or family members exhibiting cough or fever, or any known exposure to a person with COVID-19 are prohibited from attending any Dexter Little League activity until cleared by a medical professional.
- Any individual, including players, at risk for severe illness or with serious underlying medical or respiratory condition should only attend Dexter Little League activities with permission from a medical professional.

**Social Distancing**

- All players, coaches, volunteers, umpires, and spectators should practice social distancing of six feet, wherever possible, from individuals not residing within their household, especially in common areas.
- Coaches may modify practices so players work on individual skills, rather than on competition. Coaches may also put players into small groups (cohorts) that remain together and work through stations, rather than switching groups or mixing groups.

- Managers / coaches and players may be assigned spots in the dugout or on the bleachers so that they are at least six feet apart and must be placed behind a fence.
- Players are to stay at their assigned spots when on the bench or while waiting their turn to bat.
- Players and coaches will take measures to prevent all but the essential contact necessary to play the game. This should include refraining from handshakes, high fives, fist/elbow bumps, chest bumps, group celebrations, team huddles, etc.
- At the end of each game, each team will line up on appropriate baselines and tip their caps to the opponent.
- Players and families should vacate the field/facility as soon as is reasonably possible after the conclusion of their game to minimize unnecessary contact with players, coaches, ideally within 20 minutes.

Players will continue to update these guidelines as information is further developed around COVID-19 mitigation.

**Face Masks**

- Players and managers/coaches should wear face mask when in close contact areas and in places where recommended social distancing is challenging or not feasible, such as in dugouts.
- Players will be permitted, although not required, to wear a face mask on the field during game play.
- Players are required to provide their own personal face mask.

**Hand Hygiene**

- Each player should provide their own hand sanitizer.
- Players, coaches and managers will use hand sanitizer as needed and at least once between innings.

**Food and Beverage**

- Athletes, managers/coaches, and umpires should bring their own beverages, labeled, to all team activities. Shared/team beverages or snacks are prohibited.
- Food, including gum and sunflower seeds, are not allowed in the dugout or playing field.

- Families are encouraged to bring their own food/beverages as the concession stand will be closed.

- All players and coaches are to refrain from spitting at all times, including in dugout areas and on the playing field.

**Equipment**

- Equipment should not be shared. Players must have their own individual batter's helmet, glove, bat, batting glove(s).

- When it is necessary to share critical or limited equipment (ex: catcher's gear) all surfaces will be sanitized with an EPA approved disinfectant against COVID-19.
- No personal player bat bags/equipment bags should be allowed in the dugout. Player equipment should be spaced accordingly outside the dugout to prevent direct contact.
- Umpires should limit their contact with the ball, and catchers should retrieve foul balls and passed balls whenever possible.
- Foul balls landing outside the field of play should be retrieved by participating players, coaches, and umpires.

**Spectators**

- All spectators should follow best social distancing practices — stay six feet away from individuals outside their household.
- Spectators are expected to bring their own seating.

**Pre-Game Plate Meetings/Warm-up**

- Social distancing of six feet between individuals should be implemented during all pre-game plate meetings between teams and umpires. Plate meetings should only consist of one manager or coach from each team, and game umpires. All participants should wear a face mask.
- On-field warm-up should be limited as much as is reasonably possible and no more than 30 minutes.

**Umpires**

- Umpires are permitted to be placed behind the pitcher's mound/circle to call balls and strikes.
- Umpires are encouraged to keep a safe distance from players as much as possible. If physically able, umpires are encouraged to wear cloth face coverings/face masks while umpiring.
